In the Flying Corps

Lieut. Alvah Good, the only Fredericton officer who is now a member of the British Flying squadron in France, writes to his mother, Mrs. F. A. Good of this city, that he has been over the German lines in his machine on several occasions but up to the time of writing had not clashed with a German aviator. Lieut. Good has been a member of the Flying Corps but a few months, having spent almost a year with the 28th Battalion before he obtained a transfer to the Flying Corps.

He is now a member of the 5th Squadron in France and in his letter states that he has had six flights, being in the air for ten hours at one time. Lieut. Good also states that a German aviator came within 600 yards of him in the air but did not open fire. The work is interesting. But not to such a degree as he at first thought it would be. The machines are usually driven at between 60 and 90 miles an hour and Lieut. Good was at one time 5,000 feet in the air.—Gleaner.

ity according to the form of the Greek Church and there was continual friction between them and the Moslem subjects. In 1876 during the trouble in Bosnia there were some ill timed uprisings in Bulgaria which were at once suppressed by the Turkish troops but the Moslems were aroused against the Christians and aided by the Bashawi Bazonks and irregular troops they plundered fifty eight villages and murdered over twelve thousand people. The great Powers took the matter up and held a conference at Constantinople and the offer was made to Turkey to create two separate self-governing provinces. Turkey refused and Russia as protector of the Slavs made war.

By the Treaty of Berlin at the close of the Russo-Turkish war the territories of Bulgaria and Eastern Roumelia were formed. Prince Alexander of Battenburg was chosen first prince of Bulgaria in 1885 Eastern Roumelia was united with Bulgaria which caused a short war with Serbia in which the Bulgarians were successful but owing to the hostile attitude of Russia Alexander was forced to abdicate his throne and was succeeded by Ferdinand of Saxe Coburg who had much influence in bringing BULGARIA into the present war on the side of the Central Powers.
