Newcastle, Nov. 20.—The death of Miss Winnifred Kierstead, of Hartland, occurred from pneumonia in Newcastle Hospital yesterday. She was brought here from Chatham on Thursday. She had been at the Sunday school convention there since Monday. She was not feeling well when she left Hartland, but thought the change would do her good. She took ill in Fredericton en route, but persisted in her journey and arrived in Chatham Monday night. When she reached the hospital there was no hope for her. A telegram to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Justus Kierstead of Scotch Ridge, Charlotte County, failed to reach them, but they heard indirectly that their daughter was in the hospital. Mrs. Kierstead came Saturday night to see her, but thinking she must be in the Chatham Hospital, went on to Chatham, and although she drove at once back to Newcastle her daughter was dead before the mother reached her bedside.

Miss Kierstead was 26 years of age and had been a stenographer in the office of Estey & Curtis, Hartland. She was an indefatigable church and Sunday school worker, and the Baptist denomination and the Sunday school cause have suffered a great loss in her death. Besides her parents, one brother, Granville, at home, survives. The body was taken this morning to St. Stephen for interment there.
