The new pastor of the Reformed Baptist Church in this city has been in the ministry for over twenty years. He is one of the best known of the Reformed Baptist ministers in New Brunswick and Maine, and the local congregation are fortunate in securing such an able successor to Rev. S. A. Baker, the retiring pastor, who goes to Moncton. Rev. Mr. Archer has been in charge of pastorates at Fort Fairfield, Woodstock, Hartland and Grand Manan and was for many years editor of the King's Highway, the official journal of the Reformed Baptists in the Maritime Provinces.

Mrs. Julius T. Garden

A telegram was received here on Thursday evening announcing the death of Mrs. Julius T. Garden at the home of her daughter in South Nelson, N. B. The remains were brought to Woodstock on Friday evening and taken to the residence of her brother in law, Mr. J. A. F. Garden. The late Mrs. Garden during her long residence in Woodstock, was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends and acquaintances, and her death will be sincerely regretted. During her long and painful illness she received the kindest care and attention. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Percy Burchill who, with Mr. Burchill, accompanied the remains to Woodstock, one son, Harold, of Vancouver, B. C., a sister, Mrs. W. A. MacLauchlan, and her mother, Mrs. Newcombe of St. John, one brother, Wallace, of Washington State, and a niece, Mrs. N. A. Hanson, of Andover.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon from the residence of Mr. J. A. F. Garden. After a short service at the house, the body was taken to St. Luke's church, the Rev. A. S. Hazel officiating. The choir sang the hymns, "Abide With Me," and "Unto the Hills do I lift up My Longing Eyes." The interment was in the Parish Church cemetery at Lower Woodstock. The pall bearers were W. R. Balloch, J. A. F. Garden, W. L. Carr, W. A. MacLauchlan, Percy Burchill and N. A. Hanson. Harold Garden was in Nelson some weeks ago to see his mother, but was obliged to return to Vancouver. Beautiful flowers were sent by relatives and friends in Nelson N. B., St. John, Fredericton, Woodstock and Andover.

On the afternoon of Wednesday September 13th, Mrs. Eliza Jane Kilpatrick of Greenfield N. B., passed away at the residence of her son Fred W. Kilpatrick at the 87th year of her age. She was the widow of the late James Kilpatrick. Her maiden name was Eliza Jane Caldwell. She was born at Mougerville, and when only a child, moved with her parents and other members of the family to Greenfield, where she spent the rest of her life. She was the mother of thirteen children, twelve of whom survive her.—Fred W., Hubert C., Basil M., of Greenfield, James A., of Tracy's Mills, Mrs. Elizabeth Hamilton, Mrs. George Tweedie, Mrs. John Holmes, Mrs. Andrew Kinney, of Greenfield, Mrs. Harvey Manuel of Knowlesville, Mrs. Chas. W. Connell of Woodstock and Mrs. John McKnight of Fredericton. In addition to these she was the foster mother of two children, Harvey Kinney of Centreville and Israel Kinney of Blaine Me. She is also survived by several grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Mrs. Kilpatrick was characterized by kindness to others and a devotion to God. She was a faithful member of the Presbyterian church of Greenfield, and in her zeal for the Master's Work she leaves a lasting influence for good. About two years ago she was rendered helpless by a stroke of paralysis, which infirmity she bore with patience and cheerfulness to the end.

The funeral service was conducted at the home on Thursday afternoon by Rev. M. H. Manuel, assisted by Rev. D. Fiske. Eleven of her children were present, her four sons acting as pallbearers. The body was laid to rest in the Presbyterian cemetery.
