HOUSEHOLD

SPLIT-PEA SOUP
Material—One cup split peas,
2 cups milk, 2 quart water, 1
small onion, small piece of ba-
con 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tab-
lespoons flour salt and pepper.
Directions—Sook the peas
overnight. In the morning
drain and put them in the stew-
pan with the cold water, bacon
and onion. Simmer several
hours, or until soft enough to
rub through the sieve. Cook
the butter and flour together and
add to the liquid. Season to
taste. Serve with croutons of
fried bread.

**OMELET WITH TOMATO
RICE**
Materials—Four eggs, 4 tab-
lespoons milk, 1 tablespoon but-
ter, 1 cup boiled rice, 2 cups to-
mato sauce.
Directions—Beat the eggs,
add milk, salt and a dash of
white pepper. Put butter in
hot omelet pan, turn in the egg,
mixture and cook until well set.
Spread over it some hot rice
which has been mixed with to-
mato sauce. Fold, turn on to a
hot platter and pour the remain-
der of the tomato sauce around
the omelet.

LEMON PARTS
Materials—One lemon, 1
pound loaf sugar, 1/2 pound but-
ter, yolks of 3 eggs, some pie-
crust.
Directions—Grate the rind
and squeeze juice of lemon.
Mix butter and sugar, add the
beaten yolks of eggs, then the
lemon juice and rind; mix well
and let stand for a day or two.
Line patty pans with pastry, put
a little in each and bake in a hot
oven.

DATE WAFERS
Materials—One cup brown sug-
ar, 1/2 cup sour milk, 1 cup shor-
tening (scant), 2 1/2 cups each of
oatmeal and flour, 1 teaspoon
soda.
Filling—One cup hot water, 1
cup sugar, 1 pound dates, chop-
ped and seeded; 1 teaspoon van-
illa. Boil until it thickens.
Directions—Cream the sugar
and shortening, add milk, then
the oatmeal and lastly the flour,
to which the soda has been ad-
ded. Roll out very thin and
bake in a quick oven. Put two
cookies together with a layer of
the date mixture between.

RAGOUT OF VEGETABLES
Materials—One-fourth pound
of salt pork, 1 sliced onion, 1
carrot, 2 potatoes, 1 cup each of
peas and string beans, 1 ripe
tomato, 1 cup stock, 1 table-
spoon butter.
Directions—Parboil the pork
with the vegetables; drain and
slice; add stock, tomato and but-
ter. Season rather highly and
cook one-half hour.

Cooking Hints.
Sprinkle salt on the bottom of
the oven before putting in your
cake and it will never burn.
Add a little cornstarch to the
salt before filling the salt shaker
and the salt will never lump.
When jelly will not set add
the juice of a lemon or some
white vinegar and the difficulty
will be immediately overcome.

When stirring any mixture
use a wooden spoon in prefer-
ence to an iron one; the latter
will cause discoloration, any acid
working upon the metal.
The suggestion is made that
a fowl for roasting is much im-
proved by rubbing it with le-
mon-juice and then basting fre-
quently with cream or milk.
Save your lemon rinds, dry
them in the oven and store them
in an air tight tin. A little of
this added to an apple pie gives
it a delicious flavoring.

Salad a l'Anvers (Antwerp
salad) is made of lettuce with
shreds of chicken, ham and cap-
sicums, in mayonnaise sauce,
garnished with slices of pota-
toes.
Filets of beef a la Grande
Bretagne are larded, split and
stuffed with macaroni and horse-
radish sauce, and are served
with a brown sauce and potato
chips.

Caper sauce with roast mutton
may seem incongruous, but it is
excellent nevertheless. With
boiled mutton, of course, the
piquant caper is a recognized ad-
junct.

When separating the yolks of
eggs from the whites place the
egg in hot water for a few sec-
onds before breaking. Separate
immediately and allow to cool
before whipping.

If, after washing celery, you
stand it in a bowl of clean cold
water for an hour, in which a
large teaspoonful of borax has
been dissolved, it will always be
firm and crisp.

When by accident you burn
milk, take the pan off the fire
and stand it in a basin of cold
water. Put a pinch of salt in
the pan, give the milk a good
stir, and the burnt taste will
quickly disappear.

**Fresh German Troops
Verdun**

Paris, May 19.—Violent fight-
ing on a large scale was resumed
on the Verdun front last night.
Two fresh divisions of German
troops attacked the French posi-
tions at Avocourt Wood and Hill
304, west of the Meuse. The war
office announces the attacks in the
main were unsuccessful, although
the Germans obtained a footing in
a small post south of Hill 287,
which lies just to the east of Avocourt Wood.
The Germans attempted to re-
capture the small fort on the
northeast slope of Hill 304, which
the French took on the preceding
day, but their efforts failed. In-

fantry fighting was confined for
the most part to the section west of
the Meuse, east of the river, and
in the Woevre, the artillery was
active.
The official statement says that
the troops employed by the Ger-
mans in their attacks had recently
been sent to the Verdun front.
Sub-Lieutenant Navarre, one of
the best known French aviators,
recently engaged in a fight with
five German a-roploaes, brought
down his tenth machine in an aer-
ial combat at Dolante in the Argonne.

London, May 19.—Austrian
aeroplanes have bombed Avlona,
Albania, the only seaport on the
Eastern Adriatic remaining in the
hands of the Entente Allies. That
Avlona probably is well fortified
against an infantry attack is in-
dicated by the statement of the
Austro-Hungarian admiralty that
the raiding aircraft were heavily
shelled.

**Anxious To Remove Cause
Of Friction**

Washington, May 20.—In pur-
suance of a policy to eliminate all
possible causes of friction with the
United States, the German govern-
ment now proposes a solution to
the vexations von Igel case 'the
only outstanding matter left in dis-
pute. Wolfe von Igel, former sec-
retary to Captain von Papen, the
recalled German military attache,

was arrested in New York in con-
nection with a plot to blow up the
Welland Canal, and his papers
were seized by Federal agents and
kept despite vigorous protests by
Count von Bernstorff. Germany
contended that von Igel was im-
mune from arrest and his papers
immune from seizure.
The German proposal to settle
this acute controversy has now
been suggested by the German
ambassador. It is for legal pro-
ceedings against von Igel to be
dropped and his papers returned
on the understanding that he be
recalled and punished in Germany
if the evidence shows that he was
guilty of an offence.

How the State Department will
act on this proposal is not known.
The seized papers are understood
to contain much valuable infor-
mation, affecting high personage,
who were involved in intrigues
directed against Germany's en-
emies.

BOSTON, May 20.—Dr Hugh
Cabot, professor of surgery at the
Harvard Medical School, and one
of the best known medical men in
the east, heads the third Harvard
medical unit that sails for England
to-day on the Cunarder Audacia.
The group will continue the work
of the second unit, which was sent
last November, and will complete
its six months' duty on June 9.
There are 18 surgeons in the new
unit, which will form part of the
British regular medical service.
