## To Handle Entire

### Food Problem

London, May 23.—Advises from Berlin say that it is officially announced there that the Federal Council has authorized the Imperial Chancellor to establish a new board which will handle the entire food problem and be directly responsible to him.

The president of this board will be empowered to dispose of all foodstuffs, raw materials, and other articles necessary to the supplying of food; all fodder and material necessary for the feeding of animals, which are stocked within the German empire.

In urgent cases, the president is empowered to send direct instructions to the authorities of the Federal states. Adolph Tortilowicz voe Batooki, president of the Province of East Prussia, has been appointed president of the new board.
