Coun P H J Dill - I am a member of the committee and we try to find out who requires aid. The men are enlisting rapidly in our county and more aid will be required. Nearly all of the cadets have enlisted. They were too young at the start but recently have reached the proper age. If this body can see its way clear to make a generous donation it will help us do our duty.

E W Jarvis - One point you may want to know is why the committee is composed of almost all Woodstock people. Our branch was asked to act for Carleton county from headquarters. Some branches are acting throughout. We make such grants as we consider will keep a family in comfort while the soldier is at the war. All money is sent to Ottawa and what is needed is taken back. Our payments are large and growing rapidly. It is necessary to make a provision to pay our share. Our duty is simply as citizens.

D. 1915, there will for default in the payment of County, Poor and Road taxes be sold at public auction in front of the Court House in the Town of Woodstock in the said County of Carleton, on Saturday the Twenty fifth day of February A. Secretary-Treasurer—When a Coroner holds an inquest he brings in a bill covering all the expenses.

Coun Carvell—I can assure you that a dead person on the road in a community causes some excitement. We notified the Coroner and he came very quickly by auto but he didn't charge for it.

Coun Anderson—It is the time to decide whether we pay for automobiles or not. The question comes up every session.

Coun Perry—I move that the bill for an auto be thrown out. Carried.

On motion of Coun Morgan seconded by Coun Stevens, the bill of Constable Bell of \$8.00 was paid at \$5.00.

THURSDAY 10 a. m.

Council opened with Warden Tracy presiding. The Warden suggested that instead of the usual dinner that is given every year a bed be furnished in some Canadian hospital for boys at the front. If the members feel that they will contribute even a small amount, towards this bed I will gladly furnish the balance. Coun. James Gallagher suggested and moved that the members and officers contribute a dollar and a half for this purpose.

Coun Stevens—The Warden's suggestion is a good one, but the Warden must be the outstanding figure. The motion was carried unanimously.

Coun. Estey chairman submitted a report recommending that \$4000 be granted the Patriotic Committee.

Coun. Carvell moved that committee's report be received.

Seconded by Coun. Kearney.

Coun. James Gallagher moved as an amendment that the amount be made \$10,000. Seconded by Coun. Moxon.

Coun. Estey—We were guided somewhat by amounts contributed by other counties.

Coun Anderson, a member of the committee said several amounts were suggested and we decided on \$4000.

Coun. Moxon—It don't seem to me that what the other counties give has anything to do with it.

Coun. Carvell—I want it understood that I am willing to vote any amount, but I was led to believe that \$4000 would

meet the requirements this year. I would like to hear an explanation from the County Secretary as to how the committee arrived at this amount.

Coun. Smith—I was in favor of more than \$4000, but was willing to come and go, I am in favor of doing something we won't be ashamed of.

I took the views of the Patriotic Committee and the councillors. It was better to have the vote unanimous than have a fight over it. When the Patriotic Committee finished this year they had a small amount on hand. They had not received, at that time, several contributions that had been made. At that meeting they said they would require \$8000 to carry on their work—with the contribution in sight the committee would get \$1000 and if we give \$4000 it will make the amount required. I simply acted on the information given me at that meeting.

Coun. Tompkins—This Patriotic Fund has its advantages and disadvantages. Mr. Balmain's report was most gratifying. If I would voice sentiment of people where I live I would be in favor of \$10 000. Perhaps some other sections would not favor this amount. I am willing to vote for about \$5000.

Coun. Lamont—From the explanation given by the Secty-Treas. I think the recommendation of the committee should be carried out.

Coun. Burt—I am sure and know a lot of men have gone to the front because they were assured their families would be looked after. I think it better for us to vote enough and help those who have gone. The amounts have been cut down and the families are feeling sure over it. It was on account of shortness in funds that the amounts were cut down. I always voted against a reduction in the committee.

Coun. Stevens—The Patriotic Committee of the county are supervisors of amount that is allowed each soldier.

der This County contributes so much and they have an eye not to exceed the amounts. The grading system of the committee is not right. The laboring man does not get as much as the banker. If a man is used to luxuries his wife gets more for having made a greater sacrifice. This is not right. All men who have uniforms are equal.

If we don't contribute liberally to day it means to cut down. If we show a disposition to be narrow it is going to make the young man indifferent about enlisting. I don't want to see Carleton County fall behind other counties in doing its duty. Other counties have done well, why should we fall behind. I wish to go on record as favoring \$10,000 as the amount and I feel I would be doing my duty if the amount would be made \$8000.

Coun. Anderson—Do I understand by Coun. Stevens's remarks that a man living in luxury can draw more

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than the laboring man. If this is the case it is unfair.

Coun Stevens—The Patriotic Committee endeavors as they put it, to keep a family in as good circumstances as previous to enlisting.

Coun. Alex Bell—I have noticed at this board that the town councillors if anything comes up that is going to draw on the county, are liberal fellows. The committee appointed to look after this are good sensible men and I am satisfied to vote according to the committee's recommendation. We can pay as needed.

Coun Stevens—Coun Bell is most unfair—I want Coun Bell to understand that this town pays its share and a good liberal share of anything put on this county.

Coun Jas Gallagher—I would remind Coun Bell that the voluntary subscriptions in the town amounted to \$7000 and the County \$154.

Coun Melville—One good feature of this council is that all are willing to contribute to defence of the County. When a man goes to the front we are all on a level. When we spend our money we spend for results. The soldiers of France are fighting a 5c. a day and no patriotic fund. If we pay as we are doing now whose resources will become exhausted? No soldiers were ever so well looked after as ours. Families are well looked after. I saw a woman the other day decked out in jewelry—she had a wrist watch.

Coun Stevens—They are all Lieuts.

and Cois. in your part of the country.

Coun Melville—So far as our reputation is concerned I don't think much about it. Wages in our part of the county is \$1.00 a day. Ordinary soldiers are getting (53.00 a month \$4000 is the limit. I will vote for any sums to returned soldiers.

Coun Burt—What about those who don't come back?

Coun W. J. Gallagher—Each man, whether a lawyer, laborer or banker all make a sacrifice. When the laboring man goes to the front he leaves everything—Bankers and lawyers the same. We should vote something that will be a credit to us. Young men in the trenches knowing that their aged parents are well taken care of will feel better. Now is the time—don't wait till next year, I am in favor of \$10,000.

Coun Jas Gallagher with consent of seconder made his motion \$8000.

Coun Lamont—In reference to comparisons with other countries, we don't know what they have done in the past I must congratulate the people of Woodstock on their liberality—they certainly have been generous. If we put in too much assessment it may hurt voluntary subscriptions. I will vote for \$4000 and in June if more is needed I will vote for it.

Coun Morgan—We are all agreed that it is our duty to vote a sufficient sum. My parish as a whole would be satisfied with a vote of
