Dec. 29-15

Dear Friend Arthur: I received your letter last night and was awfully glad to hear from you and glad to know you arrived Home Safe but you did not tell me how your leg and foot was. You say you have not got your discharge yet and would like to come back again, want to come back again for but wont advise you for I would like to have you with us again. We are still in the same position we were in when you saw Clarence in Shorncliffe things are quite quiet here and Xmas day their was not a shot fired on our front. We had a fine Xmas dinner Duck and Chicken and all kinds of cake and pie and vegetables right behind the guns we ate in a shack and if the Germans had only known they could have got us with one shot if they had made a direct hit. Major Anderson is now Colonel of the Brigade and we have almost a new Staff all new since you were with us. I am now Limber Gunner on C gun. Promotion is slow for us you know.

All the boys send their best wishes? Price Says Hello and good luck I received those cigarettes you sent from England and many thanks. I suppose there is plenty snow in old Canada by this time plenty mud here but not awfully cold. Have been on leave to England and saw Mrs. Sheppard she thought you were still in England you ought to write to them. You remember Nick well he is down to the base.

Good night and best of luck and hope to see you in Woodstock when we come home.

On motion report was carried, including one half indebtedness of each parish.

Coun Morgan moved, seconded by Coun Melville, that Secty Treas be authorized to overdraw amount of \$5000 at the bank. Carried.

Coun Perry moved Scott Act in respect be authorized to draw \$200. as need to carry on work Carried.

Coun Melville—A young man in jail for a year for a theft says he will enlist if liberated. I would move that we ask Minister of Justice to relieve him that he may enlist.

Coun Carvell—The man is a foreigner and I don't think is eligible.

Coun Smith moved following resolution:

Whereas some years ago sleds were built at a width of 4 ft. 4 ins and in consequence the roads were a good width.

And whereas at that time there were few, if any, heavy horses.

And whereas the tendency in the last few years has been to narrow the winter roads down to 3 ft. 6 ins by using sleds of that width and at the same time using heavier horses.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that this Council memorialize the Local Government, to pass Legislation fixing a standard width for double team winter roads in the Province so that sleds would have to be built of a standard width of 4 ft. 4 ins, in order to prevent the difficulties which now proved by reason of the roads being broken too narrow to accommodate the double teams and the heavy horses.

Coun Alex Bell—Just at this time it will be considerable expense to make this change—might be better to wait.

Coun Tompkins—I am afraid this will make trouble for single puns.

Coun Jas. Gallagher—I think both ought to be considered—men with big teams and men with small ones.
