The standing committee reported
 briefly.

Moved by Couns Stairs and Stevens
 that H V Mooers be appointed chief of
 police, collector of taxes and inspector
 of the C T A at a salary of \$80 a
 month.

Coun Stevens said he had no grievance
 against Chief Kelly. He was
 looking at it from a financial stand
 point. If Mr. Mooers can do the work
 at the salary he asks, it will make a
 saving of \$500 during a year.

The motion was lost. Yeas, Couns
 Stairs, Stevens, Nays, Couns Leigh
 ton, Fisher, Nodden and Smith.

Moved by Couns Stairs and Stevens,
 members of the police committee, that
 Owen Kelly be re-appointed to vn
 marshal, chief of police and building
 inspector, at the same salary as last
 year.

Mayor Sutton said that he had several
 years experience at the board since
 Mr. Kelly was appointed chief of
 police. That gentleman has always
 been a very obliging and efficient
 officer there were none better in any
 of the cities or towns. He had asked
 the chief on many occasions to do
 certain work and he had always done it.
 There were no complaints against Chief

Kelly. He had not been asked recent
 ly to collect the taxes. If he had
 been asked and refused then we would
 know what to do. The chief is sup
 posed not to be on duty after six o'clock
 but as a matter of fact he can be found
 on duty until midnight and sometimes
 after that hour. He does not get a
 very extravagant salary: many boys
 in their teens are getting as big salary.
 If we want to add more to his work
 we might appoint him building inspec
 tor.

The motion then carried unanimous
 ly.

In reply to a question Chief Kelly
 said he would act as building inspector
 without salary, and, so far as tax
 collector was concerned, the duties of
 that position were given to a special
 collector by the Council of a couple of
 years ago.

Moved by Couns Stairs and Smith,
 that Frank Foster's tender for paint
 ing the interior of the town hall be
 accepted. Carried.

Coun Leighton made a motion to
 destroy the check made payable to the
 school trustees, and issue smaller ones
 to be cashed as needed. Carried.

Coun Leighton said he has asked for
 tenders from the local banks, to be
 handed in on the 18th for the town ac
 counts.

A lengthy discussion took place on
 military matters.

Moved by Couns Nodden and Fisher
 that a committee of three, with the
 mayor, be appointed to look into mil
 itary matters with power to act.
 Carried.

The mayor appointed Couns Leigh
 ton, Nodden and Fisher.

Moved by Couns Leighton and
 Smith, that the finance committee be
 given power to engage a stenographer
 when desired for town work. Carried.

Moved by Couns Leighton and
 Smith that a committee including the
 mayor consult with the clerk in the
 preparation of the bills for the Legis
 lature. Carried.

The mayor appointed Couns Leigh
 ton Smith and Stairs said committee.
 Coun Stevens advocated a frequent
 distribution of sand on the streets ow
 ing to the icy condition of the streets
 and sidewalks.

Coun Fisher said that people were
 grumbling already about too much
 sand being carried into the dwellings
 from the streets.

Coun Stevens said the grocery men
 requested that tenders be asked for
 the supply of the poor.

Coun Nodden said he would man
 age his own department in his own
 way, and showed how he had already
 saved money by not asking for tend
 ers.

Moved by Couns Nodden and Fisher
 that Owen Kelly be appointed poor
 commissioner at the same salary as
 last year. Carried.

Adjourned till Feb 21st.
