Mrs Geo. Y Dibblee

Fredericton, Feb. 8.—Friends were shocked at noon, when word flashed quickly about the city of the death of Miss Mary deLancy Dibblee, wife of Mr. George Y. Dibblee, and one of Fredericton's leading society women. Mrs. Dibblee's death came with tragic suddenness. She had been taken ill with a gripe about a week ago, and, unfortunately, complications set in which resulted in her death.

A particularly sad feature of the bereavement is the fact that Mr. Dibblee has himself been seriously ill for some months, and no doubt his wife's health had been materially affected by the constant care that she had to be giving her husband for the past year or more. This afternoon it was said however, that Mr. Dibblee was bearing up well, under the trying circumstances.

The late Mrs. Dibblee belonged to one of the most historic families in England or Canada. She was the daughter of late deLancy Robinson, of this city, and her great-grandfather was at one time the English governor of Virginia. Besides her husband, she is survived by two brothers, F. deLancy Robinson, of New York, whose engagement to a New York society belle was recently announced, and Mr. Corliss Robinson, manager of the Union street branch of British North America bank at St. John. One sister, Mrs. Walter W. Carr, of New York, also survives, as does her mother, Mrs. deLancy Robinson, of this city.
