HOUSEHOLD

POTATO BISCUIT.

Two cups flour, 1 cup hot rice potatoes, 2 teaspoons of baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon oleomargarine or shortening, 1 cup milk.

Put the freshly boiled potatoes through the potato ricer into bowl; sift flour, salt, baking powder into the potatoes. Then add shortening and rub in very lightly. Add milk enough to make soft dough, so it can be handled easily. Put on bake-board (handle as little as possible), roll or pat 1 inch thick. Cut with biscuit cutter. Put on floured bake sheet or pie tins; brush top with milk and bake 15 to 20 minutes in hot oven.

RAISIN MARMALADE

Two cups seeded raisins, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup water, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 cups strained apple sauce.

Wash and dry the raisins, put through food chopper, put in saucepan with water and salt, boil slowly 30 minutes; add lemon juice and apple sauce; simmer 40 minutes or until thick. Put in jelly glasses.

RICE A LA CREOLE

One cup rice, 2 cups finely cut onion, 1 cup strained tomatoes, 1 cup finely cut bacon, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley.

Wash and boil the rice as usual; spread on platter and cover with a sauce made as follows:

Put the onion and bacon in pan and cook until onion is tender and yellow; then add the tomato and seasoning; boil 5 minutes and add the flour, which has been mixed with a little cold water; boil 3 minutes. Cover with rice and sprinkle with the chopped parsley.

This makes enough for four adults, and is a most delicious meat substitute.

SPICED PRUNES.

One pound prunes, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup vinegar, 4 inch piece cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon salt, lemon rind the size of a teaspoon.

Prunes are prepared the same as for stewing—washed and soaked 12 hours, brought to a boiling point, drained, the water put on the boil; it must be down to 1 cupful; add vinegar, sugar and spices; boil 20 minutes; cut lemon peel in very thin slices and add. Pour all over the prunes; cover and let cool. They are very tasty. A jar of the spiced prunes on the emergency shelf comes in very handy at times.

BAKED TOMATOES AND CHEESE.

Two cups canned tomatoes, 2 cups fresh breadcrumbs, 1 cup grated strong cheese, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon butter.

Brush baked dish with butter; put half of crumbs in bottom, half tomatoes, a little sugar and salt, half the cheese, rest of crumbs, rest of tomatoes, sugar, salt and rest of cheese; put in moderate oven and bake 35 to



DRYING WET SHOES

Get After the Inside First and it is Easy

In wet weather the matter of drying out water-logged shoes is as much of a problem as it ever was. The great trouble is to get the shoes dry inside. It's easy enough to put them in the oven of the kitchen stove and dry them outside, but that doesn't help much. The dampness still remains within. However, there are easy ways to dry them inside for the ingenious

housewife. A garter for shoes that will do the work is made from a piece of tin pipe and an old wash basin or better yet a hole is cut in the bottom of the pan to receive the pipe and the pipe is firmly fastened in the



hole with solder. The pipe should have an elbow or turn in the end away from the pan and should be about a foot long. Put the shoe on the open end of the pipe as you would put it on a last and stand the pan on the stove. It will readily be seen that the heat from the stove goes up the pipe and into the shoe, drying it out thoroughly and quickly.

NO SPLASHING
