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#### HOUSEHOLD

POTATO BISCUIT.

Two cups flour, 1 cup hot ric- S 11 1.5 ed potatoes, 2 teaspoons of bak ing powder, I teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon oleomargarine or shortening, 1 cup milk.

Put the freshly boiled potatoes through the potato ricer into bowl; sift flour, salt. baking powder into the potatoes. Then add shortening and rub in very lightly. Add milk enough to make soft dough, so it can be handled easily. Put on bakeboard (handle as little as possible), rell or pat I inch thick Cut with biscuit cutter. Put on floured bake sheet or pie tins; brush top with milk and bake 15 to 20 minutes in hot oven.

#### RAISIN MARMALADE

Two cups seeded raisins, cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup water, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 cups strained apple

Wash and dry the raisins, put through food chopper, put in saucepan with water and salt boil slowly 30 minutes; add lemon juice and apple sauce; simmer 40 minutes or until. thick. Put in jelly glasses.

#### RICE A LA CREOLE

One cup rice, 2 cups finely, cut onion, 1 cup strained to.ratoes, cup finely cut bacon, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoo salt, 1 teaspoon Worcestershipe sauce, i teaspoon paprika, 1 tablespons flour, 2 tablespoons fine- ator of the idea. ly chopped parsley.

Wash and boil the rice as usual; spread on platter and cover with a sauce made as follows:

Put the onion and bacon in pan and cook until onion is tender and yellow; then add the to mato and seasoning; boil 5 min utes and add the flour, which has been mixed with a little cold water; boil 3 minutes. Cover with rice and sprinkle with the chopped parsley.

This makes enough for four adults, and is a most delicioumeat substitute.





#### DRYING WET SHOES

In wet weather the matter of drying out water-logged shoes is as much of a problem as it ever was. The great trouble is to get the shoes dry inside. even of the kitchen stove and dry
