Mr. Athaniel McIntyre

It is with the deepest pleasure that we chronicle the death of Athaniel McIntyre, whose death took place at his late residence, Houlton, Me., Mr. McIntyre who was a prominent resident of this town was known in political and religious circles. He was a staunch liberal, and as loyal and devoted to Christianity as he was to his daily business. He was a worthy and respected citizen, a loving and devoted husband, a faithful father and a time and loyal soldier of the Cross. The deceased had been ailing for some months prior to his death and first took his bed on the 22nd January last. The best medical attention was given him, but he received the call to "Come up higher" on Saturday last the 13th at 4 o'clock. The deceased was 65 yrs of age.

Funeral services were conducted at Houlton Me., on Sunday afternoon by the Rev. Mr. Williams of the Presbyterian church and also at the A. M. E. church in this town of which the deceased was a faithful member and local preacher. The services here were conducted by the Rev. A. S. King who preached a very touching and appropriate sermon from Rev. XIV. 13. "Blood are the dead who die in the Lord Oh; quite a large number of friends of both races were present to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed. His remains were interred in the Broadway Cemetery.

Mr. McIntyre leaves to mourn his loss a widow and ten children Messrs Ernest, Austin, Truman, Stanley, Melville and Porter all of Houlton Me., Mr. Lee McIntyre and Mrs. Charles Davis of this town, Mr. Theodore of Quebec and Miss Grace of Boston and he is also survived by four brothers and one sister.

The pall bearers were Messrs Ernest, Truman, Lee and Austin McIntyre all sons of the deceased. The service was fully choral and the choir sang "Will the Circle be Unbroken?" "Blessed Assurance," "Abide With Me," "Shall we Meet Beyond the River," and by special request A solo entitled "Alone With God" was rendered by Mrs. Thomas Nelson.
