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### Mrs. J. E. Jewett

(King's Highway.)

We are sorry to record the departure from this life on Thursday evening, May 18th, of Mary Lois, beloved wife of Dr. J. E. Jewett, of Woodstock, N. B.

Sister Jewett was born at her father's home on the Nashwaak, York Co., N. B., Oct. 22nd, 1872. She was converted in her girlhood days and endeavored to live a Christian life. After the organization of the Reformed Baptist denomination in 1888, she obtained the blessing of entire sanctification and united with the newly organized church, in her own neighborhood, and henceforth lived a devout and holy life.

June 22nd, 1898, she married Dr. J. Edward Jewett, of Woodstock, N. B., and on removing to that town united with the Reformed Baptist Church there her husband being already a member.

Our sister was a very active member of this body and took a great interest in all its activities—as church organist, teacher in the Sunday School, secretary of the Mission Society, &c. The church's success was her delight; its trials and sorrows were hers, and she bore burdens for wayward members, how heavy, only she and the dear Lord knew. How often she carried the interests of the church to her Lord and prayed that He would overrule mistakes and still bless. This deep interest continued to the end, even during her first illness.

Sister Jewett never had a vigorous constitution, but was always well until about a year and a half ago, when she consulted a physician, who counselled rest; but such an active soul seemingly could not rest, as she believed that she was not dangerously ill, and kept up her activities both in the church and home.

On Tuesday, March 14th, she became seriously ill with pneumonia. At once her sister came to her and a competent trained nurse was engaged and for six weeks she was tenderly cared for and seemingly recovered, but complained of weakness and pain in the back. On Sunday evening, May 7th, she was taken violently ill and delirious, but partially rallied on Monday and Tuesday. She continued very ill, sometimes, conscious, sometimes unconscious and delirious. But in spite of all that physician and nurses could do she gradually failed until she fell asleep in Jesus Thursday evening, May 18th, as stated.

Our dear sister was of a generous and affectionate nature, beloved by all who knew her. As one said, "everybody loved her." This can be truly said of her friends. She was always thinking of how she might give others pleasure. She will be greatly missed in her church and Sunday School, as she was a constant and earnest attendant and worker. She will be missed in the town in which she lived, as she was well known and was an active worker in the Red Cross Society and Women's Institute. But she will be much more missed by her beloved husband, who is thus left alone in his home.

Besides her husband she leaves an aged father, B. N. Goodspeed, Esq., and her brother, Clarence N. Goodspeed, both of Penniac, York Co., and an only sister, Mrs. W. B. Wiggins, of Moncton, N. B.

The funeral took place on Sunday, May 21st, at 2:30 p. m., and was very largely attended. Rev. H. S. Dow, her pastor, officiated and spoke from Heb. 12:11. He was assisted by Revs. B. C. Peltits, A. H. Trafton, J. H. Coy, S. A. Baker, P. J. Trafton and Rev. F. L. Orchard, United Baptist. The choir sang two favorite songs of our sister; "Constantly Abiding," and "When I've gone the Last Mile of the Way." Mrs. Reynolds and Rev. P. J. Trafton sang a beautiful duet entitled "I shall See Jesus." Her body was laid away in the cemetery of the town to await the Archangel's trumpet.
