'Frisko Bomb Plots

San Francisco, Feb. 10. — A total of 61 indictments were returned here today, by the Federal Grand Jury in the alleged German bomb and shipping plot cases. Franz Bopp, German consul-general; Baron E. H. von Schack, vice-consul; Baron George Wilhelm von Brincken, consular attache, and thirty other individuals and firms were accused. Bopp, von Schack and von Brincken were indicted on a general charge of conspiracy to set on foot a military expedition against Canada from within the border of the United States.

Among the specific offences alleged by the government to have been included in the bomb plot in which the consular officials were named, was a plan to blow up the Canadian end of the Sarnia Tunnel under the St. Clair River, running from Port Huron, Mich., to Sarnia Ont., Canada, through which the Grand Trunk Railway runs.

The conspiracy was alleged to have contemplated the destruction of all railways in Canada, many of which were known to have transporse munitions, tunnels on the Canadian Pacific Railway and in the Selkirk Mountains in British Columbia, and to destroy and sink cargoes and crews of ships bearing munitions for the Allies, while within Canadian territorial waters.
