never been an Empire in the true meaning of the world, will become the British Commonwealth, the greatest united Government of free men that has ever existed on the face of the earth. It will cease to be the claptrap of party, and will become the St. John Globe, birthright of all the citizens of all the Britains. If Empire it shall be called, it shall be a democratic Empire, whose sovereignty shall rise on the free will and on the passionate devotion of the governed. It has been written that trade follows the flag, but much more than trade shall follow the flag; liberty shall follow the flag, rights of nationalities shall follow the flag, individual freedom shall follow the flag, and all that we understand as Western civilization shall follow the flag, We offer this as an ideal to all the peoples of the earth, as the nucleus of the future-free Government of man, as against the "Kultur" of Potsdam.

It seems to me that another meaning of Merthyr is that men have done with the bickerings of political cliques. I am a Labor man and Socialist, but I realize that the gospel of that gifted Jew, Karl Marx, is not all the law and the prophets. The "materialistic interpretation of history" is a long way from being the complete interpretation of history. I confess I am "fed up' with the Utopias of International Soclalism when I recall the cravern actions and the hypocritical apologies of the German Social Democracy for the outrages and pillage of Belgium.

The Internationalism of the tuture, then, is seems to me, must in the first place be built up from a final and loyal acceptnace of Nationalism. The idiot notion that we can afford to allow the State to be destroyed and become just "citizens of the world" is-an idict notion. Apart from men's speculations about, and faith in, the Divine, I know, of nothing which can more clearly claim the devotion and service of all of us than the Nation. which is so much graeter than the sum total of all its inhabitants. Without the protection of the Nation we can scarcely survive birth; without the fostering care of the Nation we should be as the beasts that perish; to the Nation we owe everything that we possess in this life.




