FRIDAY EVENING.

Council met at 8 p. m. Mayor Sutton and all the councillors present.

Coun. Smith of the water committee, moved seconded by Coun. Leighton, that a settlement be made with Frank L. Thompson for \$35 for damages done done by the bursting of a water pipe. Carried.

Henry Flewelling was heard before the board and said: I represent the 67th Regt. Band. The council for 1915 made the band a grant. A month ago the then secretary, W. E. Stone, refunded \$50 of that grant to the town without the consent of the band. We have reorganised the band and now ask to have that \$50 refunded and \$25 additional as promised by last year's Council. It is almost impossible for the band to turn out on every occasion because the most of the members are married and they cannot afford to lose their pay for one day or even one half day. The money we get will go for general expenses, and none of the men personally profit by it. We will attend every patriotic gathering that we possibly can and give the town good service. Arthur Stone is now leader of the band and it has 17 members. The band has a bass and two altoes that belong to the town.

R. L. Allingham was heard before the board and said: I am here representing the Prentice Boys band. It is a good band. It will play at any time that the Council wishes it. They will do one half of the work at concerts, and on behalf of them I ask that they get one half of any monies granted to bands.

Mayor Sutton—I am in accord with the movement to assist the bands. It is a very poor town that has no band. I believe that W. E. Stone did the right thing when he refunded the \$50. Owing to the difficulty that has arisen I think we had better lay the matter over until next meeting.

Moved by Couns. Smith and Noddin that the mayor pick a committee of three of the musical talent of the board to look into the matter and report at next meeting. Carried.

The Mayor appointed Couns. Smith, Noddin, and Stevens as the committee.

W. E. Stone said he wished to reply to Mr. Flewelling's remarks. It is true that the band did not authorize him to return the money to the town. We had agreed with the Council to fill all patriotic engagements. We only played at one, that of Major Guthrie's. We found that we could not get along without a leader and tried to get one. I am glad that the band is coming along better lately. We had 14 men present when an important job was under consideration. That job should have been done, but we did not do it, therefore I felt that I should give back the money to the town.

Fleet Jones said that he was now treasurer of the band. Under Mr. Stone they did not know where the money went. They did not keep any books and only had the bank stubs to show disbursements. It is also true that Mr. Stone was the only man who refused to turn out at the engagement referred to, but the principal reason was they could get but only one cornet for that engagement.

Magistrate Holyoke presented his report.

Moved by Couns. Noddin and Leighton that the report be referred to Coun. Sairs of the police committee with power to act. Carried.

Coun. Smith made a lengthy report as to proposed improvement in the street lights and promised to have a final report later.

Moved by Couns. Smith and Leighton that an order be drawn on treasurer in favor of Strong & Noddin for \$200 rent for building occupied by battery as per agreement. Carried.

Moved by Couns. Leighton and Stevens that upon the payment of \$400, the mayor and town clerk execute a release from the judgment against W. Winslow in the property as deeded by Carleton County Agricultural Society to J. N. W. Winslow and Ross Thompson. Carried.

Coun. Leighton—in regard to the Lynch block which was bid in by Mr. Hartley for the town, I promised at last meeting that I would make a motion at this meeting to try and arrange a settlement.

Moved by Couns. Leighton and Fisher that the finance committee be authorized to make a settlement with George McPhail, mortgagee of the Lynch block, and if no settlement can be arrived at, the committee to instruct the town clerk to give two weeks public notice in the newspapers, and sell the

property at public auction for what it will bring.

Coun. Smith presented a petition signed by about 50 ratepayers against the Daylight saving Scheme, and only two in favor, which petition was chiefly signed by employees of Coun. Smith.

As the petition in favor of the scheme had not been filed with the Council the mayor handed back to Coun. Smith the petition he presented, and no further action was taken.

The bills and salaries were ordered paid and the Council adjourned sine die.
