[From the Philadelphia Ledger.] The Germans have their own ideals of freedom. It would be absurd indeed Mrs. Howard Gillett of North Bay, to represent them as groaning under the heel of tyranny. But for parlia mentary government they have neve shown any inclination or aptitude "Truly," said Charles I of England, "I desire the freedom of the people as much as any man and that they should have just laws; but as to government, that is nothing of their -," this is the German theory. No one is quicker to protest against an infringement of his rights than a German, but he regards these as personal rather than political. An efficent bureaucracy expresses his highest ideals of government. Even the Socialist, though they resent the excess of Imperialism, have essentially bureaucratic aspiraious.
