The fire was under control about 5 o'clock, though at 10 o'clock this morning several streams were still being played on the interior. Morning has not revealed any casualties other than those reported last night. Madame Bray and Madame Morin of Quebec, who were the guests of the Speaker and who were caught and suffocated in a room, and the three men, who are thought to be buried under 15 feet of debris, comprising the list. They were caught when a turret at the north side of the building fell. The men are Alphonse Desjardins, a Dominion policeman; Alphonse Desjardins, his uncle, employed in the building, and Robert Fanning, a waiter. As yet the debris has not been removed off where they are thought to be.

Several persons are missing this morning, and some officials fear that more bodies may be found under the ruins.

The Alexandra Hotel, of which B. B. Law, M. P. for Yarmouth, N. S., is a guest during the session, was trying to locate him this morning. It was stated that Mr. Law was at the House last night, at the time the fire broke out, and had not, it was said, been seen since. The hotel tried every possible means to-day to locate the member for Yarmouth. Every place in the city where it was thought he might be was searched but without avail.

"We are very much afraid that Mr. Law was in the House when the fire started, and may have perished in the flames," the house management said to-day. "He left here last night to go to Halifax, and we have been informed he was there. We have tried by every means possible to get some trace of him. We have questioned members from his own province, and others with whom he was known to be most friendly, but there is no sign of him."

No one, it is said, saw Mr. Law leave the House or the Commons after the fire broke out. He was alone in the city house of his relatives having accompanied him to Ottawa his wife.

Others missing are: Alphonse Desjardins, Dominion policeman; Alphonse Desjardins, plumber, J. B. Desjardins, assistant clerk of Commons, and A. Fanning, a waiter.

Fred M. Rutter Appointed Superintendent of C. P. R.

The announcement of the appointment to the position of Superintendent of District No. 3, Ontario Division, of the C. P. R., with headquarters in Toronto, of Mr. Fred M. Rutter, son of Mr. A. F. Rutter, of Warwick, Que., & Rutter, was received yesterday with satisfaction by his many friends. Mr. Rutter is an old Toronto boy, having been educated at Upper Canada College and the University of Toronto. He has been Assistant Superintendent of the Ontario Division, District No. 3.

Mr. Rutter, who has had a wide service in railway building as an engineer, entered the service of the company fourteen years ago. In 1902 he made the location for the construction of the Lubelle extension in Quebec. That following year he was attached to the maintenance engineering staff of the company at Woodstock, N. B., and subsequently filled the positions of Maintenance Engineer at North Bay, in charge of the location work between Megantic and Sherbrooke, Quebec; Resident Engineer of the construction

of the Toronto-Sudbury branch; Resident Engineer, Maintenance of Way, at Woodstock, N. B.; Resident Engineer, Maintenance of Way, for District No. 3, Ontario Division; Assistant Divisional Engineer of the Eastern Division, with headquarters at Montreal, and latterly Assistant Superintendent of the Ontario Division.

The territory over which Mr. Rutter will have full charge embraces Owen Sound, Muskoka, Walkerton, Elora, Teeswater and Orangeville.

This appointment is looked upon as a somewhat new policy, wherein the company will draw upon its engineers in filling important positions in the operating department.
