

OUR WAFER POWER

The Development of Late Years Has Shown Remarkable Increase

In the course of a comprehensive article on water powers in Canada, Engineering says that from an econpmic standpoint the rivers tributary to the Great Lakes are of far-reaching Importance. Of those flowing into Lake Ontario, the Trent occupies pasily the first place. This is one of the rivers whose hydraulic useainess has suffered from deforestalon, but the flow conditions have been materially improved by work undertaken by the Dominion Government, showing that the mischief is not irreparable. Now 75,000 horse-power-is capable of more or less ease development by reason of the Trent Canal Chiefly owing to the high prices, Works. Of this total, 45,000 is now fctively used, of which the Electric Fower Company absorb 33,000 horsehower. In Days Gone by Were Most Valuable Part of Fish

Among unconsidered trifles may be Included the scales of fish. Of value and utility to the owner 'uring its sojourn in the vasty deep, the scales are ignored after capture as good for the manure heap. But it was not ever thus. In days gone by fish scales possessed a real value, notably those of roach, bleak, dace, and whitebait. Older writers tell us how the scales of these fishes were collected and used in the manufacture of neckaces, ear-rings, and such-like ornaments. London fishermen used to catch the fish, take off the scales, and throw the body back into the river. A pigment was obtained by treating the scales in a certain fashion, whitebait being the most popular fish used for the purpose. So great, formerly, was the demand at times that the price of a quart of fish-scales varied from one to five guineas.
