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Will Germany Attempt to Invade England?

north of Scotland. The inevitable conclusion is that Germany wants to clear neutral waters in order that they may not observe and give warning to us of the gathering of warships, submarines, transports and Zeppelins along the German coast, from Heligoland to Borkum. Here if anywhere, the want of invasion will be collected, and the longer this operation can proceed without observation, the greater the hopes of surprise that animate its organizers.

"The great day which Germany dreads is that on which there is to be a simultaneous advance off all fronts by the Allies. In order to disorganize that attack, which she knows is coming, she delivered those furious thrusts at Verdun which cost her 200,000 men and failed to achieve their object. It is only too probable that in order to try once more to overthrow the Allies' combination on the western front, Germany may launch an invading force at our shores in hopes that it will prevent us

from sending more troops to France.

"Much might be written of the precautions which Lord French and the Admiralty authorities have taken, but this would be improper. It may be sufficient to note that the mysterious removal of the Galloper Lightship from its position twenty-five miles from the Naze is evidence that our naval authorities are getting up a few little surprises of their own. The German navy will have to bring not only their own troopships, but their own lightships if they invade England."

"Your correspondent, from his own knowledge, might considerably amplify the description of the precautionary measures taken, but all that need be said is that they are on a scale sufficient to show that the British authorities are not devoid of the possibility of Germany attempting a surprising coup de main. Even the improbability of Germany being able to keep the British fleet out of the way by barricades of mines is not left out of consideration. Britain's chief bulwark, of course, is her fleet, but in case the fleet could be outmanoeuvred or drawn out or held at bay, an invading army would find that the land defenses had not been neglected."

For Hoarseness.

To cure hoarseness, beat up 2 fresh eggs, thicken them with sugar, add a little lemon juice or vinegar, and eat a little frequently; it will soon remove. Another good remedy is to infuse a little finely scraped radish in a little water for 2 hours in a close vessel, and then add double the weight of sugar; take a tablespoonful at a dose and it will give speedy relief.

Russian Warship Sinks Esperanza

London, March 22.—The sinking by a Russian warship of the steamship

Esperanza, off Kaliakra, in the Black Sea, off the Roumanian coast, is reported in a Reuter despatch filed at Bucharest on Sunday. The Esperanza, a 7,000 ton vessel flying the German flag, is said to have been loaded with food stuffs for Constantinople. The crew was captured by the Russians.

The despatch also reports the sinking of a score of small sailing ships with cargoes of food.

A USEFUL HINT ON SELECTING DAIRY COWS

A Guide to the Farmer on the Problem of a Good Milker—Actual Butter Record Best Chooser

There are good cows and inferior cows in all breeds, and the value of a herd must always depend largely upon the owner's selecting the right individuals in any given breed. A first consideration is yield of milk and butterfat; second, conformation of type and third, pedigree. The only infallible guide in the selection of cows is the actual butter record. The amount of butter from a cow is by no means solely determined by the quantity of milk she gives. It depends as much on the richness as it does on the quantity of milk. With heifers and dry cows judgment as to their value must largely be based upon conformation and pedigree.

Dairy temperament is indicated by a spare, angular form, large, bright expressive eyes far apart, a large, straight, prominent backbone and an active disposition as opposed to sluggishness. The spare, angular form indicates the absence of any disposition to lay on fat, and the large backbone, large bright eyes, broad forehead and general sprightfulness indicate a large amount of nerve or working power. Good feeding capacity is indicated by a long, deep barrel or rouding, a large muzzle and a good constitution. A good constitution is indicated by large, bright eyes, deep, broad chest, a large heart girth, large open nostrils and a soft, pliable skin, with plenty of secretion.

How to Prove Milk Tester

Good milk organs are indicated by a large, evenly-quartered, elastic udder, running well forward and back between the thighs; large, tortuous milk veins, running well forward and preferably branched. The teats should be of moderate size and squarely placed. Good quality is indicated by a loose, pliable skin, soft, silky hair, clean bone and a general refinement, especially in the head, neck, withers, thighs and limbs. The udder of the cow is frequently misjudged. Fleeshy udders, no matter how large, are undesirable. They possess small milk-elaborating capacity and are more subject to disorders than moderate-sized elastic udders. A point that needs emphasis is the importance of constitutional vigor in the animal. A good milker is one of the hardest worked of animals, and unless possessed of a good constitution she cannot do her maximum of work.

Dairy Herd Tip

With the average milk producer the cheapest and most satisfactory way of building up a dairy herd is to select good ordinary cows and breed these to a first-class pure-bred sire. Where this is done the selection of a sire is a matter of far greater moment than the selection of a cow, because where non-pedigree cows are bred to a pure-bred sire the calves will take on more of the characteristics of the bull than of the cows. The chief merit of the sire is determined by the butter-producing capacity of his mother, his sire's mother and so on down the line. Unless a bull is descended from good milkers he need not be expected to produce good milkers.

Japs Conserve Forests

Japan exports more timber products than it imports. Korea and parts of China and Europe, Australia and the United Kingdom consume most of the timber exported, although the United States takes large quantities of oak, the large timbers used in Japan come from the Pacific Northwest of Canada. Conservation methods work successfully in Japan and complete reforestation of denuded areas can be accomplished in from 80 to 100 years. Reforestation was commenced in Japan about 30 years ago and the system is now nearly complete.

Fisheters Have Small Eyes

The reason why a fish diet is so good for brain workers is because fish contains a certain amount of phosphorus, which is excellent for the brain. It is a curious fact, by the way, that the frequent eating of fish affects the size of the eyes. Among native fishes who live very largely on a fish diet, it will be found that their eyes are much smaller than in the case of meat eaters.
