His department spent more money than any other branch with the exception of the waterworks department The streets in this town were at least as good if not better than any town of its size in the Maritime Provinces; the sidewalks were not as good as they might be. He went over nis appropriat ion slightly. but the work done was necessary, and much more work could be done profitably if the money had dsen available. Every bill had been paid and the chairman who takes his department will commence without owing one dollar.

Coun. Noddin said that he had been a candidate last year because he did not like the way things had been run. He was certainly pleased with the way the retiring Council had conduct ed business during the year, and with the good work of the different officials. He had charge of the Poor Farm and had given much attention to his duties, coming through under his appropriation, al'hough he bad paid a large number of old bills coming from other Councils. He was surprised that the County Council had not established a poor farm many years ago. They would save money by doing so, and the poor people would be better fed and better clothed. He knew of cases in different parishes where the commissioners were paying weekly \$5 each for the care of poor people and the common charge is \$3 a week. He had clothed and fed the poor people at the farm at a good deal less than \$3 a week: in fact it cost \$1.57 for each inmate a week. J. C. Hartley, the town clerk and

solicitor, in responding to the toast to the officials of the town, said that he had attended many banquets given by the different mayors, but none of the former Councils presented a better showing than the present one. Referring to the question of an assessment by the town for Patriotic purposes he said he was not in sympathy son e \$3000 of that amount yet unpaid Have a special collector wait upon the people of the town and collect that amount; make an effort to collect more money from the country districts, where over one half of the Patriotic Fund is being distributed; and with a great of one or two thousands from the County Council, of which amount Woodstock will pay one-seventh, the total would be sufficient to carry on the grants for the coming year, without any direct grant from the Town Council. must be remembered that although over half of the money paid by the local Patriotic Furd went to the families outside of town, the only monies coming in to the fund from points outside the town were the \$136 from other sections of the county. Some of this burden should be removed from the people of the town during the present year.

He said that in June, 1911 when he was in the drug business but a short time, he was served with papers for violating the Scott Act. Inspector Colpitts, who was heard before the board, said that he had not collected any Scott Act monies which duty was being performed by Magis trate Holyoke. He gave a full account of Scott Act matters during the year. He suggested that it would have been better to have had a committee wait upon him and things could have been explained better.

Magistrate Holyoke was present and while he suggested that the Council had no power to ask for his presence, he was perfectly willing to answer any questions that might be asked him. He had with him the necessary papers and he gave such information as was required-The number of the Scott Act convictions, the total fines paid and unpaid, who paid and who did not pay. etc. There was a b.screpancy of \$50 in the fines reported paid and which really bad been paid, but which would be found correct on the proper book. He explained why all Scott Act fines were now being paid to the magistrate instead of the inspector, and showed that that was the method in vogue in other counties.

Mayor Sutton explained that although the bank showed a credit balance of \$5500 at the end of December, this Council had decided to pay all bills for thirteen months.
