## CENTREVILLE, N. B.

The people of this place are pleased to note that a movement is being made in both Houses of Parliament for the restriction of the sale of intoxicating beverages, and that the People are behind the matter, pressing the workers into action. Those who favour the progress, of this matter seem to have the community interests at heart, while those who oppose it, mainly have only personal interests to consider.

The Delegates from Centreville Agricultural Society, to the Farmers and Dairyman's Association at Fredericton, gave a very interesting report of their visit to the Capitol, and the information gained by a close attention to the business of the Association.

## TOWN COUNCIL.

MONDAY EVENING.

The members of the town council were all present at the regular meeting Monday night. The town treasurer presented his report, a typewritten copy of the same being placed in the hands of each councillor and also given to the newspapers. This is one of the innovations of Coun Leighton and met with much favor from the members of the Board.

Coun Leighton reported that the town account would remain with the Bank of Montreal.

Moved by Coun Stairs and Leighton that Night Officer Jackson receive \$2 a night, an increase of 25c. Carried.

Coun Stevens was given authority to buy a quantity of vitriol.

Coun Smith moved that the school board be notified that after June 1st a charge of ten cents per 1000 gallons would be charged for water for the schools and also the meter rental. Carried.

In a discussion of the legislation to be asked for the following changes were made: A person can vote at town elections, on election day, by producing the town treasurer's receipt for taxes. That the Mayor and three councillors be elected each year—instead of every two years as proposed.

FRIDAY EVENING.

All the councillors were present but Coun Stairs, Mayor Sutton in the chair. Minutes of last session were read and approved.

The bills were read and ordered paid. Moved by Couns Smith and Nodden that the salaries due in February be ordered paid. Carried.

Moved by Couns Smith and Leighton that an order be drawn on treasurer in favor of W. E. Stone for \$25, grant to band. Carried.

Coun Nodden—I am willing to let the motion go through this time, but the band need not come back, unless they do something for the money. Since we gave the grant before, the band has been out but once.

Mayor Sutton—We are just carrying out the agreement made with the band. They were supposed to come out when called upon. We have only had occasion to ask them to come out once since we gave them the last grant.

Moved by Couns Leighton and Stevens that an order for \$16 be drawn in favor of H. W. Bourne, payment for guarantee bonds. Carried.

Moved by Couns Leighton and Smith that an order be drawn on treasurer in favor of E. Colpitts for \$50, expenses for enforcing the Scott Act.

Coun Stevens—There were \$300 uncollected at the end of last year. Mr. Colpitts must have some of that money, because I know some of that money has been collected.

Mayor—That money has probably been collected by the police magistrate.

Coun Leighton—On March 1st I wrote the inspector that I would expect him to clean up his accounts for the year 1915. Last year the Scott Act fines were collected by the police magistrate. I think the Scott Act fines should be paid the town treasurer.

The motion then carried.

Moved by Couns Leighton and Stevens that the town clerk inform the Scott Act Inspector that he must pay the fines levied under the C. T. A. each month as collected. Carried.

Moved by Couns Leighton and Stevens that Mr. Norman be heard before the board. Carried.

Mr. Norman fully explained the difference between a storage battery, which the town is considering putting in, and a gravity battery which the town is now using in its fire alarm system. By using some of the present plant, the firm of Mr. Norman would install a plant for the sum of \$2132.

Coun Nodden—The present system might be alright if we used a main wire of copper instead of the present iron wire.

Coun Stevens—All up to date towns are discarding the gravity batteries.
