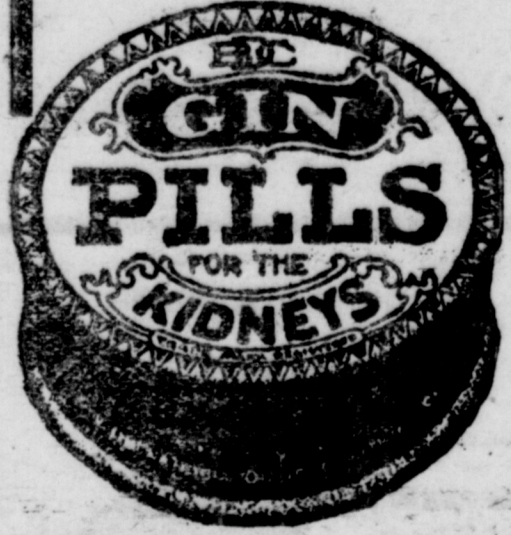

was still in the fight. Both of them had been at the front and were closely allied there. As recruiting officer for this county he was pleased to have their assistance in the work of getting recruits; he was also pleased at the assistance given him by the ladies in the good work now under way.

COLONEL BEER.

Colonel Beer thanked the audience for his hearty reception; he was pleased to address a Woodstock audience because this town contained some 200 of his boys, members of the 140th Battalion. He gave a full account of his experiences at the front from the time he left Canada Oct. 3, 1914 with the Lord Strathcona Horse, until he left the battle field to return to Canada; he had been in the trenches some six months. He remarked that not one man had been lost during the transport of troops from Canada to England, although some had been lost in the Mediterranean. He first had his baptism of fire at Festubert, his battalion relieving the 10th Batt. then in charge of him who is now on the platform Colonel Guthrie. It was one of the finest lot of men that ever left Canada. He now had the honor of being commander of the 140th Batt. He wanted to know every man in his Battalion and every man could know him. We are now in a war for freedom. If that freedom is lost to us, it will be lost for ever. This is a fight for your own fire side, young men. The men over there are doing their bit; it is impossible to think that the young men of military age will refuse to answer to the call of our own boys which is: "Boys come out and help us."

COLONEL GUTHRIE.

Lieut. Col. Guthrie said it was always a pleasure for him to come to Woodstock knowing the loyalty of the people. He paid a tribute to the late Sgt. Allison Bull who had gone to his death in defence of his country. "Many young men are at the front," said the speaker, but not sufficient, and that is the reason we are holding meetings all over the county. It almost seems a shame to have the government asking men to enlist, but such is our voluntary system. Boys, you don't know what you are missing at the front. You must be real men—go out and help them in the fights that are to come. They are gallant men fighting your fight and calling to you for assistance. Col. Guthrie related several incidents in connection with engagements in which he took part and had nothing but praise for the gallant men who gave their all in defence of the Empire. Speaking of Belgium he said there never was such an instance of bravery as shown by the gallant King Albert and his little army. Belgium did her work and is now devastated, her woman violated and children maimed. She is still fighting. When the cry of helpless people came across the straits of Dover, Britain stood on her treaty rights and declared war.

"Why I enlisted" was briefly responded to by Corporal Gallant and Private Green, the latter spending six years in the British army and six years in the United States army having been born in the latter country.
