CANADA'S RECRUITS NOW TOTAL 309,616

OTTAWA, April 19.-A total of 309,616 recruits were enlisted up to April 15. The average for the past four months has been between 800 and 900 a day. Enlistments in December were 23,074, in January 29,212, in February 26,658, and in March 32,705.
