A REVOLVING HOUSE

You Can Regulate Wind and Shade
According to Desire

The newest thing in summer houses and outdoor sleeping porches are the revolving kind. These are made easily.

Design the sort of summer house you want, only don't attach it permanently to the foundations. Build a platform of good stout timber on the usual foundations. Fasten a steel rod at least an inch in diameter in the center. The rod can be as long as desired.

Get a dozen or more substantially built steel casters and attach them to the bottom of the house. In the center of the house fasten a block



to the floor and pierce the block to receive the steel bolt.

The idea is that the open part of the house can be revolved so as to catch the breeze or avoid it. Also the occupants can get a change of scenery as often as they like.

If the casters are well made and the platform on which they run mounted properly, the house is easily revolved.

DONT PASTURE TOO SOON

Feed Cow Well During Two Months of Rest

The average cow that freshens in the spring begins her year's work with a serious handicap. She does it if she is poor in flesh, and the cow that is dry during the winter or a stripper is apt to be, for a low production does not prompt good feeding. Good clover, hay and corn silage or clover hay and fodder corn will bring a dry cow up to her period of freshening in goodly fair condition, but wild or starchy hay and corn silage will not.

It is now generally accepted among farmers who make a study of their cows that good feeding during a dry cow's six weeks or two months of rest is as profitable as any more business of any other time. A fresh cow that is converted into milk soon. Her milk flow will be larger and her test will be higher when she freshens, if she is in first class condition.

Shortage of feed, the rush of spring work and the temptation to turn the cows on pasture before there is food there for them are all to the disadvantage of the cow that freshens in the spring. Whatever may be the portion of the rest of the cows and look it will pay to feed the cow well that is soon to freshen. Not only a high milk production and a weak calf follow poor feeding at this time, but poor birth retention which may lead to serious illness.

PROTECTING MINERS

Canada's Death Rate High—Belgium's Low—Why?

The accident death rate among miners is greater in Canada than any other civilized country. This is due largely to the hazardous nature of the work and to the class of labor available for employment. The fatality rate in coal mines in Belgium has been the lowest in the world, being but slightly over one per thousand employed. In 1959, the fatality rate in Belgium was as high as it is in Canada. The decrease is the result of the combined efforts of the mine owners, the workmen, and the government, and it is due, to a great extent, to diffusion of technical and professional education. In view of its importance, the Government should direct more attention to the education of the workman, so that he may not be a danger to himself or others and that he may become better educated, more skillful, and thus have the opportunity to better his position.

Dry Battery Trouble Lamp

Dry batteries, testing eight ampères, or less, will operate small electric-light bulbs and doorbells satisfactorily. Four cells wired in series to any desired length of cotton drop cord, terminating in a miniature pull socket, that is equipped with a six-volt lamp, will provide a good trouble light for a considerable period.
