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HOUSEHOLD

OATMEAL BREAD.

To 1½ cups of rolled oats, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 cups hot water, 1 tablespoon lard, add ½ cup molasses and ½ yeast cake dissolved in ½ cup of lukewarm water. Knead with white flour. Let rise over night. Knead in the morning, put in pans, let rise again and bake.

JOHNNY CAKE.

Beat 1 egg, add ½ cup milk and 2 tablespoons melted butter. Combine 1-2 cup Indian meal, 1-2 cup white flour, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 tablespoon sugar and ½ teaspoon salt; add to milk and egg mixture. Put in pan and bake in a moderately hot oven.

BANANA DESSERT.

Take half a dozen bananas, slice them into a deep dish, squeeze the juice of half a lemon over them, covering them with water and one-half cupful of sugar; stir them with a dessert spoon; place in ice chest one hour before using.

POTATO PUFFS.

Into 1 cup of pot. mashed potato, stir 1 tablespoon of melted butter and beat to a cream. Add to this one egg, well beaten, 1-2 cup cream or milk and salt to taste. Beat all thoroughly, pour into a deep dish and bake in quick oven until well browned. If individual puffs are preferred, pour the mixture in gem pans.

MAPLE PUDDING DESSERT.

Maple pudding is a cheap wartime desert. Here is the way it is made:

In a double boiler, heat one quart of milk, and one-fourth teaspoonful salt and stir in four tablespoonfuls of corn starch mixed to a paste with a little cold water. Stir constantly until the mixture thickens, then cook in the double boiler eight minutes. Mix six tablespoonfuls grated maple sugar with one beaten egg, add to the corn-starch and stir until the sugar is dissolved. Do not boil. Mold in cups and serve with maple sugar and milk. To make a chocolate pudding, substitute three heaping tablespoonfuls of cocoa in place of the maple sugar and flavor with a few drops of vanilla and one-half teaspoonful of cinnamon.

Household Hints

Add a pinch of baking powder to the pie crust.

Mutton is one of the most easily digested meats.

Carrots and peas mixed make a very good dish.

Grate an apple into your horseradish and you will have a fine relish.

Ashes should always be sifted to save the cinders.

If the soles of shoes are coated occasionally with painters' oil they will outwear the uppers.

Scrambled eggs and onions are made by first frying the onions, then turning the eggs into the pan and stirring as usual.

Sour milk should never be wasted—it can be used in biscuits and gingerbread or for Dutch cheese, or for griddle cakes.

Have on your pantry shelf several cans of condensed milk, and if the milkman is delayed you are not without milk.

Large oranges are more economical than small ones, because half of a large orange is enough to serve one person at breakfast.

Colored clothes should never lie in soapy or dirty water, but be washed in clean water, instantly rinsed and hung in a shady place.

It is never wise to ask the cook to serve an untried dish to guests. To be sure of a good dinner, have the things the cook has made successfully.



If the shoe soles are worn, even to holes, they may be mended by applying a coat of glue and covering with a piece of thin leather, or even felt. Will not stand wetting.

Glue may be made water proof by soaking it in water till it becomes liquid and then adding painters' oil. Keep it in a warm place till the remaining water has evaporated.

A potted plant makes a very pretty centerpiece on the dinner table, but if you would keep the plant in healthy condition spend a third of its time in a sunny window.

Cover a child's broom with a duster, preferably a dustless duster, using it to clean wainscoting, the lower parts of chairs and tables or any place where a woman is obliged to stretch or stoop.

To soften paint brushes which have become dry and hard heat as much vinegar as required to boiling point, immerse the brushes and allow them to simmer for ten minutes, then wash in strong soapsuds.

New linoleum should not be washed more than necessary. Rub once a week with a mixture of beeswax and turpentine and rub daily with a dry duster. This will harden the linoleum and make it last twice as long.

Breeders Directory

For Sheep and Swine

The past year has seen a marked increase in the demand for sheep and swine, both pure bred and commercial, among the farmers for breeding purposes. This demand is, of course, due in part to the greatly increased price of

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lamb, mutton and wool and in pork and its products. Further, farmers in the Maritime Provinces are realizing that there are considerable areas of waste land that could be utilized very profitably through sheep.

As this demand has grown very rapidly much difficulty has been experienced by intending purchasers in their efforts to locate breeders of sheep and swine from whom reasonable numbers of breeding animals can be obtained. Already numerous inquiries are being made by men who are desirous of purchasing, as to where animals can be located and purchased for fall delivery.

In this connection, so far as sheep are concerned, breeders would be well advised to retain their best ewe lambs for sale for breeding purposes since all indications point to a continued demand for breeding females and the conserving of ewe lambs is the only ultimate source for supplying that demand and permanently increasing our sheep population.

With this in view and in order to facilitate and direct breeders, G. Erle O'Brien, Representative for Sheep and Swine Husbandry in the Maritime Provinces, under direction of the Live Stock Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, has prepared a breeders' directory for pure bred and commercial sheep and for pure bred and commercial swine in each of the Maritime Provinces, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island. This directory

contains the name of the breeder, his address, the breed of sheep offered for sale, and the number of animals for sale annually.

This directory of breeders of sheep and swine can be obtained by making application to the Live Stock Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Sixty-Seven**Persons Killed**

St. Louis, Mo., June 1.—Sixty-seven persons were killed in the tornado that swept through several counties in southeast Missouri and southern Illinois, Wednesday, according to despatches received from various sources last night. Hundreds were injured and the property loss was enormous. Wires are down in storm-swept districts and communication virtually is impossible.

Drop Bombs on Germans in Belgium

London, June 1.—Many tons of bombs have been dropped by the British aircraft on the Belgian towns of Osend, Zeebrugge and Bruges.

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
