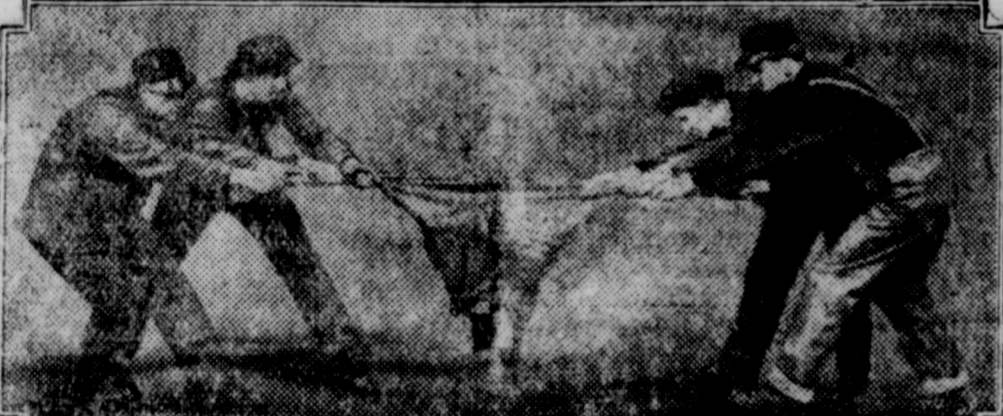

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William Weade

William Weade died at his home in Royalton, Carleton County, on August 5th. Mr. Weade had been in his usual health until the afternoon of the previous day when he was stricken with illness in the hay field. The cause of death was heart failure. The deceased was 72 years of age and had lived at Royalton all his life. He was one of the most highly esteemed men in the Parish of Wicklow; and was beloved by all for his kind and gentle disposition. There are left to mourn a daughter, Edith, and a son, Harvey, at home; a sister, Mrs. Hannah, at Caribou, and a brother Charles, in California, and a large connection of other relatives. The funeral took place on Aug. 6th, at Tracey's Mills United Baptist Church, of which church Mr. Weade had been a member for fifty years. The services at the house, church and grave were conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. J. Hurlow and were largely attended.

Percy Winslow Grant

Fredericton, Aug. 30—Private Percy Winslow Grant of Fredericton has been killed in action serving with the infantry.

Mrs. Aurelia Grant, of 332 Church street, this morning received official information that her eldest son, Private Percy Winslow Grant, had been killed in action in France on August 15. He was a son of the late Neville Grant of Fredericton, and was about twenty years old. He left Canada with the 140th Battalion. Besides the widowed mother, two sisters, the Misses Eva and Anna, and one brother, Julian, survive. Private Grant is the first man of African descent from this part of New Brunswick to give his life for the empire. (Private Grant was a cousin of Rankin Wheary who went overseas with the 104th Battalion.)

TOWN COUNCIL

The Council met at 8 p. m. on Monday, Labor Day. Mayor Burt and all the councillors were present.

Messrs. Walter Estabrooks and Geo. Flowering were heard before the board, asking for repairs to the road near the Valley Railway Station. Both these gentlemen were willing to use their horses and do what they could personally to help on the work.

Moved by Coun. Fisher, seconded by Coun. Leighton, that the road committee be instructed to put on the road machine for say one day and a half, and procure the necessary gravel, so that the road may be put in a fair state of repair.

Town Treasurer Comben reported for the month of August. The credit bank balance is \$11,619.69.

The mayor read the following letter which was written to J. C. Berrie, Petewawa, Ont., by W. S. Sutton, M. L. A.

"Replying to yours of Aug. 27th, would say: I am writing the mayor and town council asking them what they are prepared to do regarding stabling for the Battery horses, if the Battery should return to Woodstock. The Council will have a regular meeting on Monday evening next, and I have asked them to give me an early reply. I have had the matter under consideration, so has had Hon. B. Frank Smith, and as soon as I hear what action the Council takes, I will let you know."

Coun. Stevens—I understand that the barn is alright but is not large enough. The 65th Battery had 45 horses when here last winter, and it will have some 15 horses more next winter.

Moved by Coun. Stevens, seconded by Coun. Fisher, that a committee be appointed to take the matter up with Mr. Sutton and report on Friday evening. Carried.

The mayor appointed the following committee: Couns. Stevens, Flemming and Leighton.

The following motion was moved by Coun. Smith, seconded by Coun. Leighton:—

That the tender of the New York Continental Jewel Filtration Co., for the erection in the town of a filtration plant and the making of necessary alterations in the Pumping Station, be accepted and that the mayor and clerk be authorized to execute the contract for the performance of the work according to the plans and specifications of the town's engineer, Mr. A. K. Grimmer, and to affix thereto the town's common seal.

The contract for the filtration plant would be \$64,948. The extras would probably bring the cost up to \$70,000.

After remarks by Couns. Stevens, Fisher and Flemming, pointing out that the tender was larger than anticipated, the motion carried.

Moved by Coun. Smith, seconded by Coun. Leighton, that the pure water committee be authorized to accept the tender of the Fraser Chalmers Co., of Canada Montreal, when the company is satisfied with some changes to be made, for the furnishing and erecting in place, of the additional pumping machinery at the pumping station in said town, according to the plans and specifications of the town's engineer, A. K. Grimmer, and the town clerk when so instructed by said committee be authorized to wire such acceptance of tender and when same is so accepted that mayor and clerk be authorized to execute the necessary contract therefor and affix thereto the town's common seal.

This motion was carried.

Voted that the town rent its motor to the Potato Products Co.

Voted that the poor committee be empowered to invest some \$400 to purchase young stock to eat the surplus hay on the farm.

Some matters of routine business were transacted, the bills were read, and Council adjourned till Friday evening.

The entertainment in the A. M. E. church on Monday evening, Aug. 20, was a great success. It was arranged by Miss Alice Winslow, who also instructed the children who took part in the programme. About \$15.00 was realized which is to go towards the insurance of the church.
