TOWN COUNCIL

MONDAY EVENING.

Council met at 8 p. m. All the councillors were present. In the absence of Mayor Burtt, Coun. Fisher was chair man.

Minutes of last meeting were read. Approved.

Treasurer Comben reported for October: Receipts, \$1108.86; expenditures, \$4800. Credit balance, \$6061.06. A sale of pure water bonds \$6326.16, was deposited to the pure water account. Referred.

Magistrate Holyoke rendered his report. Referred.

Moved by Couns. Leighton and Fewer that Geo. A. Manuel be appointed a constable and member of the police force. Carried.

Geo. F. L. Flemming was heard before the board in reference to a sidewalk of 20 feet length in front of John McClement's shop. The sidewalk would cost you \$20, and he would bear one half of the expense.

Moved by Couns. Flemming and Smith that Mr. Flemming be requested to go ahead with the work, and the town will pay one half of the cost. Carried.

Donald McKendrick was heard before the board in reference to an accident to himself and horse, caused by falling into a trench.

Referred to street committee.

Coun. Flemming stated that the caretaker of the poor farm, Simon Adams, was unable to get the manure from the Moore barn, as ordered by a resolution of the Council.

Some discussion took place on the question, but nothing could be done until advice was received from the military department at Halifax.

A letter was read from Edgar A. Neal, complaining that while cleaning the standpipe recently, the water went into his cellar, to the depth of two feet, and spoiled his preserves, etc.

Referred to street committee.

FRIDAY EVENING.

Council met at 8 p. m. All the councillors were present and, in the absence of the mayor, Coun. Fisher took the chair.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Coun. Fewer reported progress for the committee, Couns. Fewer, Flemming and Stevens, who have in charge the question of supplying cheaper wood for the citizens of the town.

In reply to the letter of Percy W. Thompson, referred to a committee, Coun. Stevens moved the following resolution, seconded by Coun. Smith, which was carried unanimously:—

Whereas application is to be made at the next session of the Legislature to change the rule of the road in New Brunswick, causing all vehicles to pass to the right instead of the left; therefore

Resolved—That the Town Council of Woodstock, N. B., hereby places itself on record as being in full accord with the proposed amendment to the road act and earnestly ask for its passage.

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Moved by Couns. Stevens and Smith that the fire committee be allowed to spend a sufficient amount of money to properly fix up the fire alarm system.

Carried.

Voted that orders be drawn on treasurer for \$90 for Percy Corbett, and \$300 for A. K. Grimmer, and charged to pure water account.

In answer to Coun. Stevens, Coun. Leighton said that there were about \$7000 due on taxes; that the taxes had been better paid than in former years; that nothing was done as yet toward selling the properties, mentioned at a previous meeting, under the lien law, as all had been settled but about \$60; that the property sold some time ago under the lien law was still held by the town clerk, and had not been resold.

Progress was reported in the cases for damages by Messrs McKendrick and Neil against the town, and the complaint of E. K. Connell, that his property has been injured by a drain, needing repairs.

Coun. Fewer asked that the wood committee be given more power so that they may contract for wood. It is a most serious question and should be grappled with.

Coun. Leighton was opposed to the Council going into the wood business. On two former occasions the town lost money by handling wood.

Coun. Stevens thought that the committee could go ahead and see what is the best that can be done.

The members decided to call a special meeting of the Council when the wood committee were ready to report.

The bills and salaries were ordered paid and the Council adjourned.

Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Bingham, Moncton, have received news that their son, Gunner Fred Bingham, died of wounds on Oct. 26th. Gunner Bingham enlisted two years ago with the 65th in Woodstock, and went overseas with a draft from the 65th. Upon reaching the other side he was drafted into an artillery unit at the front. Deceased has a brother, Abram, at the front.

Medical Board In Woodstock
