Memorial Services For Fallen Heroes

Tribute of Respect to Memory of L. Corp. Parsons and Pte. Simeon Porter

(Gleaner).

The George Street Baptist Church was packed to the doors Sunday evening by the friends, acquaintances and tormer associates of William Parsons, who gave up his life's blood on the fields of France, August 15th. The memorial service Sunday evening was one that will be long remembered by those present. It was impressive and cannot help but leave the good effects upon all fortunate enough to be there.

The Rev. J. E. Wilson of Woodstock, formerly pastor of the George street church, delivered the memorial sermon. The Rev. Mr. Wilson was the clergyman who received Mr. Parsons into the church, and it was ficting and opportune that he could be present to sulogize the life that he so admired and respected.

Mr. Wilson took his text from Hebrews 11th chapter and 4th verse: "By faith Abel offered unto God a more ex cellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts, and by it he being dead yet speaketb."

The speaker pictured the beautiful life lead by the young hero while he was active in the affairs of the church and city life. He feelingly spoke of the young man's interest in all things that pertain to the Christian life. He said the young man's going speaks to us of the highest type of patriotism; secondly, it speaks of the highest sense of duty and obligation to duty that can not rightly be thrown aside; and it also speaks of the strong Christian manhood that always stands ready to face any danger, and respond to any call of duty. no matter what the cost or how great the personal sacrifice.

Fifteen days public notice of the time and place of holding election to be given by Parish Clerks by posting in three most public places of the Parish. Nomination of Candidates to be filed with the Parish Clerk or to be left at his residence at or before six o'clock p. m. on Monday, the 1st day of October next.

Parish Clerk to post names of Candidates in three of the most public places in each Polling District on or before Thursday the Fourth day of October next. Candidates' names also to be posted up at the Polling Places before the opening of poll on day of election.

The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as the case may be) to act as chairman unless he retuses to serve, or is absent, or not competent by reason of relationship of candidate, when chairman to be chosen by electors present.

Assessors are required to fur. nish Parish Clerks with list of electors.
