Mr. Daniel McCartin

On Friday evening after a long illness, the death took place of Daniel McCartin, at his home, here, aged 83 years.

Deceased was born in Ireland and when a mere lad he enlisted with a noted British regiment, which almost immediately was sent to take part in the Crimean war and, so far as we know, was the last survivor of that war living in Canada. After the conclusion of that war he continued with his regiment until he served 21 years when he received an honorable discharge at Halifax. He later was one of the body guard when the late King Edward, then Prince of Wales, visited Fredericton, and had a pleasant interview with the prince who knew his regiment well.

After receiving his discharge he worked for a short time in St John where he was married. Johnville, Carleton county, was then being settled by the late Bishop Sweeney, and 43 years ago the deceased came to Woodstock, intending to take a farm in Johnville, but instead he secured a job on the C P Railway and remained here, one of our most honored citizens, until his death. He leaves one son, John, and one daughter, Elizabeth, who is the president of the Ladies Auxiliary A. O. H. for the Maritime Provinces, both residing at home.

The funeral held at 9 o'clock on Monday morning was largely attended. A high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev J J Ryan in St Gertrude's church and words of comfort spoken, after which interment was made in the Catholic cemetery, the pall bearers being Jas S McManus, P Bradley, Thomas Dunphy and Alex. Scott of St John.
