Kerensky Seems To Be Winning

WINTER PALACE, Petrograd Sept. 12.—While unable yet to report the final overthrow of General Korniloff, members of the Russian provisional government in conversation with the Associated Press last night, summed up the situation optimistically.

The new commander-in-chief of the Russian armies, Major General Bonch-Bruyevitch, who formerly was attached to the staff of General Brusiloff one time commander-in-chief, has from the first been devoted to the provisional government.

An unconfirmed report received at the capital is to the effect that part of General Korniloff's army is surrendering.

In an interview Vice-Premier and Minister of Finance Nekrasoff informed the Associated Press that General Spreievski, commander on the Caucasus front, and Lieut. General Dmitri St. Chorbatcheff commander on the Roumanian front, had definitely declared their allegiance to the government. From General Steduyeff, the commander on the Westera front, no news has been received,

corridor and outside M. Kerensky's offices were posted 200 sailors of the Second Baltic Corps.

All through the night M. Kerensky received resolutions from army and navy units promising to support him. The Council of Workmen and Soldiers' Delegates sent telegrams to the Telegraph Operators Unions declaring that the operators by refusing to work for Korniloff could help to crush the revolt.

Premier Kerensky issued an order to the Petrograd garrison denouncing Gen. Korniloff for opening the front to the Germans and for sending a division of Asiatics against the capital; while professing to defend liberty.

M. Tchnoroff, Minister of Agriculture has resigned from the cabinet. Ninety arrests were made in Petrograd last night. Gen. Michaelieff was arrested at Moscow.

Premier Kerensky has ordered the procuror of the Petrograd court to put Gen. Korniloff on trial under the historic one hundred and fifth statute for conspiring to overthrow the existing order.

During the night Premier Kerensky had a conference with the procuror and dictated a lengthy description of the details of the conspiracy.

Petrograd, Sept. 12.—The provisional government to-day declared that a state of war exists in the town and district of Moscow.

The newspapers here announced to day that by order of the government former Grand Dukes Michael Alexandrovitch and Paul Alexandrovitch have been transferred from their private residence at Gatchina, near Petrograd, to the ministry of the interior.

Moscow, Sept. 12.—The municipal council of Moscow has issued a proclamation intimating that the inhabitants of the ancient capital of Russia ought to rise as one in defense of the revolution and prevent civil war.

General Voikhovsky called all the officers of the garrison together in the public square, and was given assurance that they would support Premier Kerensky. The St. George Cavaliers have made a special offer of their services and their appears to be unity among the workmen's groups.

Petrograd is said to have sufficient provisions to last for four or five days.

Petrograd, Sept. 12.—An abortive attempt to prevent civil war was made by Prof. M. Milukoff, leader of the Constitutional Democrats, former foreign minister and one of the prime movers in the revolution.

LATER

Petrograd, Sept. 12.—The Associated Press is informed that Premier Kerensky will become commander-in-chief of the Russian armies until the revolt is quelled.

Vice-Premier Nekrasoff in an interview distributed to-day by the Russian official news agency, said that the political situation could be considered perfectly favorable. All the commanders at the front with the exception of Gen. Denikine, commander of the western front, who has been arrested, with his chief of staff, by the military committee, remain faithful to the provisional government. Pekoff is in the possession of the government troops.

Germans Are Evacuating Many Towns in Belgium
