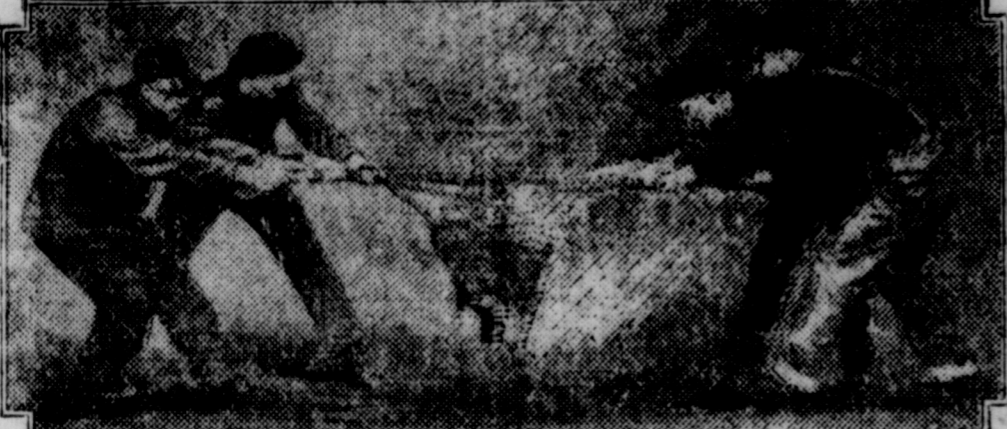

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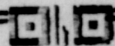
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Memorial and Honor Roll Day Connell, N. B. July 22, 1917
