

EXEMPTION TRIBUNALS MILITARY SERVICE ACT 1917

# For the Attention of Class One Men

The location of The Exemption Tribunals in this district is as follows:--

Tribunal N. B., No. 45-Woodstock No 47-Bath No. 43-Plastes Rock No. 44-Graud Falls No. 55-McAdam

These Tribunals will commence to deal with claims for exemption on November 8th.

All claims for exemption must be made not later than November 10th.

Those who make or have made their claim for exemption in writing through the Post Office will receive notice by registered letter of date on which their claim will be dealt with.

Those who neglect to make use of the Post Office must present themselves in person at a Tribunal on November 8th, 9th or 10th, and they will then be informed as to when their claims will be dealt with.

Reports for service must be made on or before November 10th through the Post Office.

Severe penalties are provided by law for failure to report for service or claim exemption as above.


en with apoplexy, from which he did not rally, passing away late Sunday afternoon. His age was 74 years.

Lieut. George Paget Owen Fenwick, brother of Mrs. G. C. VanWart, of this city, has made the supreme sac rifice, and poured out his life's blood at Freedom's Altar in France, Oct. 30th. The sad news reached Freder icton on Tuesday in a telegram to Mrs Van Wart.

The young man enlisted at Edmon ton in the 115th, going overseas in September, 1916. He was connected with a machine gun company and, while directing its fire, met his end

The deceased was one of those bright young men, with prospects of a brill iant future, who gave up all that the future held near and dear to go forth in battle for the cause of right.

He was a graduate of Sussex Gram mar School, the University of New Brunswick and Dalhousie Law School, He also had taken a post graduate course of two years at Queen's Univer sity. For two years he was Principal of Dorchester High School, and after ward was on the faculty of the Wesley an University, Middleton, Conp. He was a member of the Class of 1902 at U. N. B.9

After finishing his duties at Wesleyan he moved to Edmonton for the practice of his profession. Here his abilities

were quickly recognized and he was soon made Deputy Attorney General for Alberta. He was rapidly making himself felt in the legal world of his province, when he dropped all in rea ponse to his country's call.

He was thirty-five years of age and unmarried. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. G. C. VanWart and Miss Lena Fenwick, of this city. Two brothers, Rev. L. A. Fenwick, of Jack sonville, Carleton county, and William A., connected with the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railway with headquarters in Boston.

The young man had many warm personal friends in this city, he having been a social favorite while attending the University.

His many acquaintances are sourow ed at the news of his death, and extend heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved relatives.
