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**HOUSEHOLD**

**Overseas Candy**

As Christmas time begins to  
draw near we are all interested  
in candies which can be sent to  
our men overseas. The follow-  
ing are all simple and will travel  
well if carefully packed.

**BROWN SUGAR CANDY.**

Take three cups of light brown  
sugar and one cup of cream. Boil  
until nearly done and drop in a  
lump of butter the size of a wal-  
nut. Try in cold water and when  
it rolls in a soft ball between fin-  
ger and thumb, remove from the  
fire. Add broken nuts and beat  
until nearly cold. Pour in butter-  
ed tins and cut in squares.

**PENOCHÉ.**

3 cups of light brown sugar.  
1 cup of granulated sugar.  
1 cup of chopped nuts.  
1 cup of milk.  
2 tablespoons of butter.  
1 teaspoon of vanilla.

Put sugar and milk over a slow  
heat and do not stir until it be-  
gins to boil. Cook until a trial  
piece is easily formed into a ball  
in the fingers when cooled in  
water.

Remove from fire and add the  
butter, letting it melt on top.  
When the outside of the sauce  
pan feels cool, begin to beat the  
mixture, adding the flavoring and  
the nuts. Beat until creamy and  
pour into a buttered pan, having  
been careful not to beat until too  
hard to put into the pan. When  
cool, cut in squares.

**OLD FASHIONED TAFFY.**

2 cups of brown sugar.  
2 cups of corn syrup.  
1 tablespoon of vinegar.

Cook until it strings, cool, pull  
until light, cut in short pieces,  
and wrap in oiled paper.

**CANDY PUDDING.**

2 pints of granulated sugar.  
½ pint of water.  
2 tablespoons of vinegar.  
1 tiny pinch of soda.

Mix all together and heat very  
slowly until all is thoroughly  
blended and the sugar dissolved.  
Then cook quickly until brittle  
when dropped in cold water.  
Pour on greased marble and,  
when a little cool, pull like taffy  
until light. Then work into this  
one cup of grated coconut, one  
cup of seeded and chopped rais-  
ins, one cup of almonds and one  
cup of pecans cut in pieces. Make  
into balls and wrap in bits of oil-  
ed paper.

**CARAMELS.**

2½ cups of sugar.  
1 cup of cream.  
3 tablespoons of butter.  
1 teaspoon of vanilla.

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Caramel ½ cup of the sugar and  
add to the rest of the sugar, the  
cream, and the butter after these  
have been put together and have  
come to a boil. Cook until thick,  
or until it dries on a saucer. Beat  
until creamy, add nuts if desired,  
and pour into greased pan. Cut  
in squares just before it hardens.  
Wrap in oil paper for shipping.

**CANDIED DATES.**

Two cupfuls granulated sugar;  
½ cupful cold water, pinch cream  
tartar; boil together until a little  
dropped into cold water becomes  
hard; drop dates into mixture  
about 1-2 dozen at a time. When  
they are well covered with sugar  
place on buttered plates to dry.  
Nuts and figs may be candied  
the same way.

These candies may be made  
with water instead of cream if  
desired.



**Dried Pea Puree**

Dried peas are both nutritious  
and good, and deserve more at-  
tention than they receive in most  
homes. The following is a de-  
lightful way in which to serve  
them:—

1 cup dried green peas.  
3 cups water.  
Few grains soda.  
2 tablespoons butter.  
Salt.  
Pepper.

Put dried green peas through  
grain mill or food chopper, and  
soak over night in three cupfuls  
of cold water. Then cook in this  
same water with a few grains of  
soda until very soft and water is  
nearly evaporated. Rub through  
sieve, add butter, salt and pep-  
per to taste, and beat until light

**Marriage Licenses Only To Healthy.**

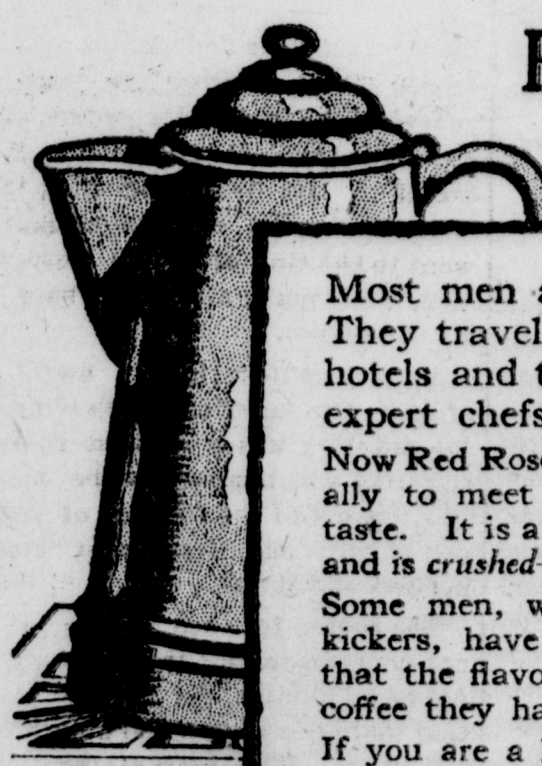
That a blood test and a clean
