


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Damage By Rain In Western Maine

Bangor, June 19. —Threatening flood conditions were occasioned in western Maine by heavy rains Saturday and Sunday. The total rainfall for the 24 hours, according to the Portland weather bureau, was four inches, up to 8 o'clock Sunday night. The total rainfall for the month at midnight reached nine inches, which broke all records for the first 17 days of June. The street railroads in Portland and vicinity ran on delayed schedules all day Sunday and the inter-suburban line between Portland and Lewiston was obliged to suspend at 6.30 o'clock Sunday evening.

At Westbrook on account of floods on the Presumpscot, the big Warren paper mills have been suspended. Late Sunday night the water was within two feet of the bridge at Riverton. At Gorham, on the Worcester division of the Boston & Maine, a landslide buried the track under eight feet of mud in places and a steam plow and a large crew of men were sent to clear the way. All Maine Central trains were delayed and the train from Bangor, due at Portland at 6 o'clock Sunday evening, was stopped three times between Waterville and Portland while the crew got out and shoveled mud from the tracks.

The water Sunday night was four feet above the flush boards of the dam of the Cumberland Power & Light Co., Bonney Eagle, which supplies power and light for Portland and preparations were being made Sunday night to dynamite the

flush boards to relieve the strain. At Yarmouth several houses have been inundated and the street railway transferred passengers for a distance of about 300 feet at one point.

Of late years he has been afflicted with kidney disease and heart trouble. He was a conservative in politics and a prominent member of the Orange Lodge of Woodstock. He is survived by the widow, three sons William J. B. and Harry F. at home, and J. Ansley of Woodstock, and three daughters, Mrs. Burns Cluff of Northampton, and Mrs. Mozart Benn and Mrs. Jesse Knowlton of Debec.

The funeral took place at two o'clock on Sunday afternoon, Rev Samuel Howard officiating. Members of Woodstock Lodge, L. O. L. No. 38, of which the deceased was a prominent member, followed the remains to the grave. The burial took place in the Kirk cemetery at Northampton. The pall bearers were: Nathaniel Peed, J. T. Montgomery, John Morrison and George Green, members of Woodstock Lodge.

Mrs. Mardock McKenzie

After a brief illness, Mrs. Mardock McKenzie of Glassville entered into rest at the age of 86 years and 11 months on June 11. She was the widow of Mardock McKenzie, who pre-deceased her 21 years.
