

More Smallpox Cases Found

Fredericton, Nov. 19.—Reports of well defined cases of smallpox at points as widely separated as Minto and Knowlesville, Carleton Co., made this morning to Dr. R. H. McGrath, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, show

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that the smallpox outbreak is spreading to sections which were thought to be free of the disease.

Dr. G. H. Coburn, of Minto, reported to Dr. McGrath this morning that he had discovered a man with a well-developed case of smallpox who had been walking about Minto, and evidently had been in general contact with the people. Where he had brought the disease from was unknown. Steps were taken at once to isolate the man and precautions will be taken to prevent the disease being carried out of the infected place. The trains of the Fredericton and Grand Lake Railway and the New Brunswick Coal and Railway

Company will be inspected on arrival at both Fredericton and Norton and all passengers from Minto examined and vaccinated.

Yesterday a young man reported to a physician at Bristol, Carleton Co., for medical examination in order to join the 65th Field Battery at Woodstock. He stated that he had walked twenty-four miles, having been in a lumber camp at Knowlesville in the southwest Miramichi. The man's face and mouth showed distinct evidence of smallpox, and he was sent back to Knowlesville, and steps taken to put on a quarantine there.

In the household of Henry Hawkins of Douglas, four new cases of smallpox of a mild type have occurred, vaccination having modified the disease. His son, Roy Hawkins, brought one of the earliest cases of the disease from North ern Maine.

The cases of smallpox now existing in the province are classified according to county as follows: Victoria, 25; Carleton, 3; York, 12; Northumberland, 1; Sunbury, 1. General vaccination to combat the disease probably will be extended.

(The St. John board of health was to-day warned of the finding of the case at Minto.)
