

> Yesterday a young man reported to a physician at Bristol, Carleton Co., for medical examination in order to join the 65th Field Battery at Wood stock. He stated that he had walked and mouth showed distinct evidence of smallpox, and he was sent back to Rnowlesville, and steps taken to put on a quarantine there.

In the household of Henry Hawkins of Douglas, four new cases of smallpox of a mild type have occurred, vaccinat ion having modified the disease. His son, Koy Hawkins, brought one of the earliest cases of the disease from North ern Maine.

The cases of smallpox now existing in the province are classified according to county as follows: Victoria, 25; Carleton, 3; York, 12; Northumberland. 1; Sunbury, 1. General vaccination to combat the disease probably will be extended.
