all mothers. Pay it off this year and make one noble assessment today.

Coun. Smith—When Great Britain or Canada wants money how do they raise it? By a loan.

Coun. Phillips—In making my motion I had no intention of injuring the soldiers—No man has more respect for these men than I have.

Coun. Flemming—We are face to face with most unusual circumstances. Personally I am in favor of paying the whole amount in one year.

Coun. Eatey—I think the original motion is the one that should be passed. Many are giving their sons to protect us and we should do our part.

Coun. Morgan—I think the conditions at this time are such that this County is in a position to pay the whole amount this year. I will vote for the original motion.

Coun. Melville—I can't think people can raise this amount of money in one year. I will vote for one of the amended ones.

Vote—Amendment to the amendment lost. Amendment was lost.

Original motion was carried.

Mr. Wm. Balmain, treas. was present and on request explained some of the details of the Patriotic Fund. He stated that about \$1200 per month was being paid out.

The Warden thanked Mr. Balmain for the information furnished.

Coun. Melville for the committee appointed to confer with the Secty-Treas submitted the following report. To the Warden and Members of the County Council of the County of Carleton.

Your committee appointed to meet with the Secretary-Treasurer report that they have met and have gone over the Accounts with reference to the amount reported by the Auditor to be in his hands and after examining into the matter and getting from the Secretary-Treasurer all the information which he was able to furnish we are of the opinion that the Secretary Treasurer has apparently not been credited in the accounts audited with a sum approximately \$1200.00 and this would leave in the Secretary Treasurer's hands the sum of approximately \$1700.00 made up of Jury Lists which there are still payments to be made and Cash. We would recommend and the Secretary Treasurer has expressed a desire that an experienced Auditor should be placed on the accounts to act in conjunction with our Auditor to see that a complete audit is made from the date on which Mr. A. N. Vince made his last audit to the present time. And that the report of the Auditor to be appointed, be submitted at June Session, 1917.

Chas. Comben was appointed Auditor.

It was moved that S. L. Lynott be official Reporter.—Carried.

Finance Com. was appointed—Couns Morgan, Gallagher, (Woodstock) and Paillips.

Building Com.—Couns. Burt, Flemming, Melville.

Scott Act Com.—Couns Clark, Lamont, Tompkins.

Perry and Melville go up to Wicklow they won't find conditions very bad.

Coun. Perry—I voted in the affirmative but I am willing to leave the question in the hands of the Councilors of the Parish, and I will move the former vote granting license be rescinded and put in hands of Councilors of Parish.—Seconded by Coun. J. W. Gallagher.

Coun. Melville—I am willing for the lower man to have a license too. Am not desirous taking authority away from councilors of the parish.

Coun. Melville—I think this motion is out of order.

Gentlemen:—

I beg to submit the annual report of the Local Board of Health, District, no 10, for the year ending December 31st, 1916.

With the exception of diphtheria there were very few cases of contagious diseases during the year. Cases of diphtheria occurred in different places in many parts of the District. In nearly every one of these cases the disease was confined to the house in which it was discovered. There were two deaths. All of the expense of the year was for diphtheria antitoxin, fumigating material and for looking after cases of diphtheria.

The several bills are inclosed.

The Board respectfully ask for the usual appropriation of three hundred dollars.

Warden Tracey—In the face of the large assessment we have this year I would suggest that we contribute 2 days pay—accepting 3 days pay.

Moved by Coun. Flemming, seconded by Coun. Kearney, that Councilors be paid 3 days pay.

Coun. Kinney moved that 4 days be paid.

Coun. Morgan—This motion is out of order. This council has no right to contribute another man's pay.

Coun. Flemming—This letter be an animous and unless it is I would feel like withdrawing my motion.

Couns. Lamont and Bell thought that 4 days should be paid.

Coun. Phillips—We could have got through the business in 3 days. Coun. Flemming withdrew his motion.

Coun. Morgan moved Secretary and Fin. Com. be authorized to arrange an overdraft of \$15,000. Carried.

Coun. Moxon moved \$75.00 be assessed and charged Parish of Woodstock for winter roads. Carried.

Coun. Melville read the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

Whereas:— There is a likelihood of the Canada Temperance Act being repealed in this County at an early date, whereby the Provincial Prohibition Act will immediately come into effect, necessitating the appointment of an Inspector over a certain district or districts, and

Whereas:—

Our present Secty Act Inspector, John E. McLean, Esq., of the Parish of Richmond, has rendered excellent services in the discharge of his duties and on account of his experience and high moral qualities is well qualified for a position of trust.

Resolved

That in the opinion of the members of this Board, Mr. McLean would be a suitable person, to be appointed as Inspector of the district, or districts comprising the County of Carleton, or portions of this County and adjoining Counties when the Provincial Prohibition Act comes in force, and we hereby respectfully recommend to the Provincial Legislature, for their consideration the appointment of Mr. McLean as above outlined.

He moved that Secty Treas. hand a copy to Provincial Government. Seconded by Coun. Bell (Richmond).

Coun. Perry—This is out of order. We have no prohibitory law.

The motion carried.

No other business being offered the Council adjourned.

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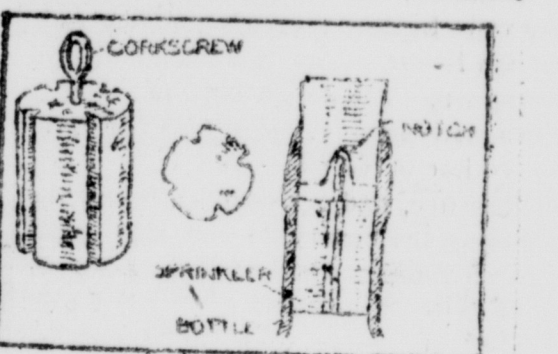

CANADA MUST ECONOMIZE

Depression Will Come With Peace— Economy Imperative

Economy is not being practised extensively in Canada. We are sharing the prosperity which war has brought to the American continent. Prosperity is infectious. It does not always conduce to thrift. Men frequently save more when money is tight and the outlook is uncertain than they do when money is plentiful and the future assured. Today the position here is the existence of temporary good times, dependent largely upon war orders. Peace will bring a jolt. How serious it will be, none can tell. Nor can we know what favorable factors will counteract the depression which must come. The strain of economic readjustment. These facts make economy imperative. Yet even although their patriotism be undoubted, nevertheless many Canadians are aiding the enemy by thoughtlessly frittering away the profits and earnings due to a prosperity which may be suddenly arrested by the advent of peace. The trade returns continue to furnish evidence of the importation of many unnecessary articles and, to the extent that this is the case, our financial ability to resist the enemy is lessened. The words of Sir Charles Addis, in his address on "The Means of War Finance," apply to Canada as much as to the United Kingdom, when he says that people "do not understand that by the manner of their personal expenditure they may be determining whether the horrors of the conflict are to be prolonged or the blessings of peace anticipated. There does not appear to be as yet any general or adequate recognition of the special responsibility for the right use of war earnings attaching to those whose prosperity depends upon the continued sacrifice of life and limb by their fellow-countrymen in the field. It is surely a small thing to ask of those who are restrained from joining the fighting line by the disabilities of age, or infirmity, or sex to make some sacrifice for those who are fighting their battles for them. Sacrifice is what we call it what it is—a privilege, perhaps the only privilege left to us."

Shaker Top That Fits Any Bottle



There are many times the cook wants to use a sprinkler bottle when she hasn't one. Shaker tops are very easy to make for any bottle. Two corks and a small corkscrew are all that is necessary.

Put the corkscrew into a cork that will go down into the neck of the bottle. Notch the cork so that there will be four channels for the contents of the bottle to flow out. Have the top of the bottom cork low enough to permit a top cork to fit in the neck. The corkscrew is there for the purpose of pulling out the notched cork when it needs cleaning.

A JUMPING KANGAROO

A Mechanical Toy That May be Made Easily

The newest kind of mechanical toy, according to the toy dealers' bulletin is a jumping kangaroo that jumps without the aid of a spring or any sort of inner works—simply utilizing a well known section of the law of gravity. Any one clever enough to carve rude figures in wood can make one.

The large hind legs of the beast are fastened immovably on an axle or pin and are attached, one on each side, so that they will swing together. Then the kangaroo is placed on a slightly inclined surface.

When the figure falls forward so that the front legs touch the inclined



surface the tail flies up and causes the swinging hind legs to forward until they come in contact with the incline again and relieve the weight from the front legs which go up and then come down again by force of gravity, the operation being continued as long as the surface is inclined and the kangaroo moving forward by little leaps and bounds throughout the operation.

Adjust the weights in the body carefully—i. e. at least the weight of the body, so that the proper balance is obtained.
