In the area described. They were in a prosperous condition as compared with the civilized Eskimo with whom we were familiar to the west. That is, they were better dressed, better fed, and had fewer wants that had to go unsupplied.

The contrast can be seen by comparing this village with a typical village of the civilized Eskimo, such as that at Baillie Island. Here last year six died and three went insane, while about half of the remainder are seriously and obviously sick.

Carried. Several bills were read and ordered paid.

Moved by Coun. Leighton, seconded by Coun. Fewer, that an order be drawn on treasurer to pay the expense of the recent election.

Carried. Moved by Coun. Fisher, seconded by Coun. Leighton, that an order be drawn on treasurer in favor of Capt. J. C. Berry, 65th Battery, for \$200.

Carried. Moved by Coun. Leighton, seconded by Coun. Flemming, that during the year all bills must be presented on Monday night, those coming in on Friday night to lie over until the following month and not paid unless by the unanimous consent of the Council.

Carried. On request of Coun. Fewer the dog tax will be collected this year by the license committee through the chief of police.

Moved by Coun. Fisher, seconded by Coun. Stevens, that three or four tons of coal be purchased by the street committee at \$7.50 a ton.

Carried. Moved by Coun. Fewer, seconded by Coun. Stevens, that the chairman of the different departments be limited to expend not more than \$25 without the consent of the Council.

Carried. Moved by Coun. Fisher, seconded by Coun. Stevens, that the driver of the town team be paid \$65 a month, to commence on the 1st of January.

Carried. On motion the salaries falling due were ordered paid.

On motion the mayor and town clerk were instructed to sign an order for \$1000 when the board of school trustees need the money.

The petition of John G. Hastings for a refund of school tax was referred to the finance committee. Adjourned.
