A'hens, J n 6 -A despatch to the London Morning Post says:

"The local press which is exclusively pro-government and under existing conditions entirely under the orders of the King and authorities, declares in language of all degrees of passion that the situa tion is becoming intolerable and that Greece is not disposed to allow herself to be forced by hunger into meek acceptance of the alites' arbitrary wishes.

"As Greece cannot by her fleet break the blockade this can only mean that she will declare war by land against the allies. In fact this is more than hinted by the press, which demands general mob iization. The government plainly indicated the same thing in its protest of yesterday to the allied powers by saying it must refer the

Lindon, Jan. 6.—The Greek council of ministers has approved a restriction of the daily rations and the appointment of a food dictator, says an Exchange Telegraph Company despatch from Athens to-day.

Arrests of person accused of sedation, which had ceased for several days, have been begun, the despatch adds.

London, Jan.-A despatch to the Times from Piracus, dated Dec. 31, says that the real key to the situation in Greece is the military position in Macedonia. According to this story, King Constantine has received discouraging news from beyond Monastir to the effect that Field Marshal von Mackensen considered it impossible to move en Monastir before another two months at the earliest. The Greek government realized, therefore, says the despatch, that if it broke with the Entente it would have to support the struggle alone.

Germany Unable To Prolong War

Paris, Jan. 5 .- Writing in the Figaro, to-day, Alfred Capus says:

"It is not a bad thing to familiar ze public opinion to-day with possible conditions of peace. In fact the situation has entirely changed since Germany proposed the conference.

'D.scussions of this kind would have been dangerous last year, They would have led the enemy to believe us weary of war and would have strengthened his confidence. Because he has taken the initiative the case is reversed this year and it becomes evident that Germany is now unable to prolong the war for more than a few months.

"This does not man that she is Before submitting to them she will use her last military and diplomatic resources and will strike many dangerous if we fail to prepare for them hour by hour. This will probably be the characteristic feature of the war of 1917. We must be prepared to meet formid able onelaughts and repulse them vigorously. Out of this a peace will evolve, which this time our adversaries will have to sue for and not suggest with dominating superiority.

"Then it will fail to the Allies to state their conditions. There will be no question of arranging the national life of 100,000,000 human beings, but simply to safeguard oneself as far as humanely possible against their voracity. The experience of two years has pointed cut the means to do so.

"Each one of the A'lie! coun tries has come to realize what are the conditions indispensable for her own particular safety. Russia has mentioned her's. The forthcoming reply to President Wilson will lay down ours. Great Rritain and Italy will speak in their turn. Then, when the supreme battle opens, the idea of peace will be clearly outlined in all minde; the end in view will be discernible to all eyes."

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Kaiser's Appeal To The People

London, Jan. 6.—The German Emperar, according to a copy of an order to the German army and navy, received here, charges the Allies with rejecting his offer of peace because they desire the descruction of Germany. He declares that all the responsibility for further sacrifices fails on his enemies and that "with God's belp. Germany's arms will enforce the understanding they have rejected."

Amsterdam, Jan. 6 .- A Berliu elegram says that the following order of the German Emperor to the army and navy nas been offi ially published:

(Central Powers) rulers, I proposed to our enemies to enter forthwith into peace negotiations. Our enemies refused my offer.

"Their hunger for power desires Germany's descruction. The war will be continued. Before God and humanity I declare that on the governments of our enemies alone falls the beavy responsibility for all further terrible sacrifices from which I wished to save

"With justified indignation at cur enemies' arrogant crime and with determination to defend our holiest possessions and secure for the fatherland a happy future you will become as steel. Our enemjes did not want the understanding offer by me. With God's help our arms will enforce it.

Raphael Sees Finish of War

England's well know astrologer, Rap hael, whose predictions are always a waited with interest, has issued his almanac for 1917, in which he predicts the end of the war this year. He says that the President of the United States will be in danger during the winter, as well as some notable citizens of the States. He predicts a serious naval disaster in the United States during the summer and the inauguration of a religious crusade against places of amuse-

In regard to the war, it is significant that astrologers in the United States have also predicted the end of the war in 1917, the majority of them fixing the date about July 27. Ralphael says that in the fall and winter of the present year (1916) there is an ominous direction of Mars and Saturn which portends the defeat of Germany, the overthrow of kingly power and the establishment of a German republic; 1917 will see the end of the war and the Kaiser, too.

Austria-Hungary Near Collapse?

London, Jan. 8 .- A Berne despatch to the Daily News says:

"If news reaching here from usually trustworthy sources is accurate. Austria-Hungary is very pear collapse. No effort is made to conceal the differences which have arisen between the two Kaisers, and Swiss newspapers attribute to Count Golachowski. a statement that the quarrel between the monarche has gone too far to be patched up.

"Austria compelled Germany to agree to a joint offer to open peace negotiations, and now that the offer has been definitely rejected, well in formed neutral observers state that developments of even more sensational character may take place during the next few weeks.

"The liberty allowed to newspapers in the discussion of peace is held in some circles here to indicate that the authorities are anxious to make in flamed public opinion an excuse for ending the war."

Berlin, Jan. 7, via London, Jan. 8 .-"One of our submarines, says an offi cial statement issued today by the Ger man admiralty, "torpedoed and sank on Dec. 23rd, in the eastern Mediterran ean an enemy transport of more than 5.000 tons. The vessel was accompan ied by waiships."
