Early Settlers Acquired Ground For Almost Nothing-Winnipeg In the pioneer days

Winnipeg land in pioneer days was the cheapest thing in the province. Early settlers acquired all they desired for a song. Property that sold for a few dollars, to-day is worth many Chousands. A glimpse at the history of early property owners and the land they occupied is interesting.

First of the pioneers who acquired real estate was Andrew McDermot, sturdy Irishman. He was a merchant farmer, horse trader and cattle dealer. He engrossed the freighting business, acted as the company's right-hand man in all contracts and public undertakings, speculated in houses and land, built mills, encouraged manufacturers, and later commenced forming a little colony, of which he was head. In the early days A. G. R. Banna type was the postmaster. The first building entirely devoted to the purposes of the post office was used in 1870.
