the vicinity of the cove crops in Kent
so that the outcrops at the two place
are presumably on the same general
horizon."

There has been slight working at
Dunsinane near the I. C. R. in the
County of Kings a few miles east of
Sussex. The area is separated from
the margin of the main basin by ridges
of Lower Carboniferous. Near Stones
Brook, the coal outcrops in a seam of
twenty inches. Several rifts have been
made to a depth of seventy-five feet
and small shipments of coal taken out.
It resembles that of the Grand Lake
basin.

The Commission of Conservation has
estimated all the coal of the Carboni-
ferous area at not less than one hun-
dred and fifty million tons which corre-
sponds to the estimation of Dr. Bailey
from the survey of 1899.

FAST GROWTH OF
WESTERN CANADA

Early Settlers Acquired Ground For
Almost Nothing—Winnipeg in
the pioneer days

Winnipeg land in pioneer days was
the cheapest thing in the province.
Early settlers acquired all they de-
sired for a song. Property that sold
for a few dollars, to-day is worth many
thousands. A glimpse at the history
of early property owners and the land
they occupied is interesting.

First of the pioneers who acquired
real estate was Andrew McDermot,
sturdy Irishman. He was a merchant
farmer, horse trader and cattle dealer.
He engrossed the freighting business,
acted as the company's right-hand man
in all contracts and public undertak-
ings, speculated in houses and land,
built mills, encouraged manufacturers,
and later commenced forming a little
colony, of which he was head.

First Post Office, 1870
In the early days A. G. R. Bann-
tyne was the postmaster. The first
building entirely devoted to the pur-
poses of the post office was used in
1870. It was a log building and was
situated nearly opposite the Hotel du
Canada. It is recorded as an event
of considerable importance that in
June, '71, the postmaster "had boxes
arranged in the post office, for the
use of merchants and others."

The carrying of the mail was under-
taken in 1871 by an American stage
company. The stage arrived for the
first time on the 11th of September
of that year. The arrival of the stage
was a great event. One had the feel-
ing that it was something like the
clouds opening and letting in a ray
of light. Sometimes in winter the
stage was blocked.

The telegraph was instituted in 1870.

and the rates were very high, some-
times upwards of \$2 for ten words to Ter-
onto, yet it was greatly used. The
first connection was made with the
American lines by way of Pembina.
This took place on Nov. 20, 1871.

The fact that in the old days there
was little demand for farm products
had led to non-production, and a con-
sequent scarcity as soon as popula-
tion increased. The necessity for
cheaper food buildings being erected,
but in the spring of '71 rough lumber
sold at \$70 per thousand, and poor
lumber it was at that; dressed lumber
was \$100 a thousand.

Hudson Bay "Blankets"

For many years the Hudson's Bay
company had been the medium for
carrying on the business of the coun-
try. One of the most interesting fea-
tures of their monetary system was
the paper money known as Hudson's
Bay "blankets," much larger than our
dollars, and like the bank notes in Brit-
ain. These were of the denominations
of five pounds, one pound, five shil-
lings and one shilling and to Cana-
dians especially that of the smallest
value was a great curiosity indeed.
