#### Little Food For Invaders

The latest news from Roumania available by Dutch and Russian papers explains that a great part of the food stuffs were carried away from Braila and the northern portions of the country before the Germans were in possession. The Novoe Vremya publishes a despatch from its correspondent with the Roumanian troops at Galatz which gives a vivid account of the rush the Germans made to restore the pipelines destroyed by Roumanian ingenuity and save the stocks of food. This despatch, which is printed in the Allgemeen Handelsblad of Amsterdam, clears up points that have been obscure even to the most intelligent observers.

The correspondent writes that it has been necessary to form an army of German and Bulgarian laborers to collect live stock and provisions, and that the country has yielded no great amount of food to the invaders. The main difficulty was with the stocks of grain, wheat, rye, barley and oats, which a system of storing by the Roumanian Government had materially increased. Though it is to be feared that a good deal of this foodstuff was not destroyed effectually, much was removed in wagons over roads specially made for the purpose.

As regards the Roumanian harvest and its prospective yield, there is an interesting letter by L. Georgescu in the Vie Agricole et Rurale of Dec. 11. The climate of Roumania is one of great extremes. The crops are dependent on the rainfall, and a close parallel exists between the harvest and the amount of rain. The winds of spring and summer are dry and hot, except in early spring, whilst autumn is marked by a particularly cold blast. All this makes "dry farming" necessary and profitable; that is, the ground must be ploughed in July deep furrows to protect seeds from the harsh extremes of temperature. These hot and cold waves are most common near the Cernavoda Bridge and along the marshes of the Danube, which regularly rises and overflows depositing a thick clay. The winters are severe, the thermometer going to 30 below zero and the ice makes agricultural operations impossible.

The Roumanian authorities believe that with the oil wells mainly cut off operation and the winter and spring coming on without the necessary farming in season, the country will produce comparatively little in the way of harvests. The Roumanian farmer is always troubled by the dryness of the climate, and the crops are inevitably reduced in these circumstances. Unless sowing is done early in autumn and late in spring there is a good deal of danger to grain. Roumania therefore affords many difficulties to the hungry invader.
