## TOWN COUNCIL

MONDAY EVENING.

The Council met at 8 p. m. Mayor Burt was absent attending a "Win the War Conference," as the representative of the town, in session in St. John. Couns. Fisher, Smith, Stevens, Fewer and Flemming were present with Coun. Leighton in the chair.

Treasurer Stevens reported for January and February; Receipts, \$1718.63; expenditures \$5452.65; credit balance at bank \$2657.26.

Referred.

Police Magistrate Holyoke's report was read and referred to audit committee.

Voted that John G. Hastings be paid \$7, refund of school poll tax paid by him since he has passed the age limit.

The chairman read a letter from Colonel Richard O'Leary requesting the attendance of the mayor at a "Win the war conference," to be held in St. John.

Filed.

A letter was read from Arthur Bragdon, stating that his daughter, Margaret, owing to the slippery sidewalk, fell and broke her arm, necessitating her absence from school and the services of a doctor and nurse. He thought the Council should pay the expenses, about \$75.

Referred to street committee.

Coun. Fewer, chairman of the police committee, was requested to ask Night Watch Jackson to assist Chief Kelly in the collection of small taxes, the treasurer to take other means for collecting the larger amounts. It was thought that between \$2000 and \$3000 should be collected on last year's taxes.

Moved by Couns. Smith and Fewer that the water committee be instructed to employ Engineer Grimmer of St. Andrews, to go over our water and fire systems and make a report.

Carried.

Moved by Couns. Stevens and Smith that Mrs. Chas. Condon and Mr. P. Bradley be appointed school trustees to succeed themselves.

Carried.

Messrs George H. Sutton and Thos. McCarron were appointed pound keepers and their barns constituted legal pounds.

Adjourned.

FRIDAY EVENING

Present His Worship the Mayor and all the councillors.

Coun. Smith occupied the chair at the opening of the Council, until the arrival of the Mayor.

Moved by Couns. Leighton and Flemming that the clerk lien on a list of properties, some 30 in number, the owners of which have not paid the taxes for two years.

Carried.

Coun. Fisher reported progress in the matter of Arthur Bragdon, referred to at Monday's meeting.

Coun. Leighton referred to the fact that there were between \$550 and \$650 due on Scott Act fines, outstanding since 1915, and he wanted to know why they were not collected. He made a motion asking the clerk to write to the Police Magistrate, and request an answer as to why the fines were not paid. The motion was not seconded.

Voted that the magistrate be heard before the board.

Police magistrate Holyoke—I have only to say that the fines are unpaid. There is no law on earth that can make me collect the fines. If Coun. Leighton thinks there is, he can go ahead and try.

The bills were read and ordered paid. All salaries falling due were ordered paid.

Moved by Couns. Leighton and Stevens that an order be drawn on treasurer in favor of the C. P. R. for \$13.50, for gatemen for December.

Carried.

Moved by Couns. Stevens and Fewer that the firemen be granted a license for one week, for a show, commencing June 5th, at \$50.

Carried.

Moved by Couns. Flemming and Fisher that repairs be made at the house at the pumping station, not to exceed \$55.48.

Carried.

Mayor Burt reported the results of the "Win-the-War" conference held in St. John on Tuesday which he attended.
