**HOUSEHOLD**

**CODFISH EN CASSEROLE.**

One cup rice, four cups milk, one cup flaked codfish, two eggs, two tablespoonfuls butter, salt, pepper, bread crumbs. Cook the rice in the milk until it is creamy. Then add the flaked fish, butter, well beaten eggs and seasoning. Butter the casserole and pour in the mixture. Sprinkle bread crumbs on top and dot with butter. Bake until nicely browned.

**CRANBERRY SALAD.**

One cupful of boiling water to four cupfuls of cranberries. Boil twenty minutes. Strain, add two cupfuls of sugar and cook five minutes. Stir in one-fourth cupful each of stuffed olives, celery and walnuts, cut in small pieces. Pour into small moulds rinsed with cold water and chill. Unmould on crisp lettuce leaves and serve with mayonnaise dressing.

**GINGER SNAPS.**

Mix together 1 cup of molasses, 1 cup of sugar and 1 cup of butter or lard. Add 1 egg, 1 tablespoon each of ginger and vinegar and 1 teaspoon each of soda and salt. Stir in sufficient flour, about 3½ cups, so that you can knead the dough. Roll as thin as possible, shape with round cutter, and bake in a quick oven, on inverted buttered biscuit tins or cookie sheet.

**JELLIED PRUNES.**

Soak a half box of gelatin in half a cupful of cold water. Dissolve in two cupfuls of hot water in which the prunes were cooked. Add a quarter cupful lemon juice, one and a quarter cupfuls sugar, strain and add a half pound of prunes, cooked, stoned and halved. Set away to harden. Sometimes cream is used on it, sometimes soft custard and sometimes whipped cream.

**ENGLISH ROLLED WAFERS.**

Heat one-half cupful of dark molasses to the boiling point, add one scant teaspoonful of butter or other shortening, and stir until it is dissolved. Have in readiness one teaspoonful each of ground cinnamon and ginger, sifted with one scant cupful of flour and one-third of a cupful of sugar and gradually stir the hot molasses into it. Drop small portions from the tip of a spoon to a greased baking sheet, and have them two inches apart. Bake in a slow oven, cool slightly, remove from the pan and roll quickly over the handle of a wooden spoon. When rolled, lay on wax paper to dry.

**Tell Of Losses**

**By Submarine**

Paris, March 7.—The following official statement was issued this evening.

"During the week ending at midnight, March 4th. 859 merchant ships of over 100 tons net of all nationalities, excluding coast-

ing and fishing vessels, entered French ports.

"During the same period one merchant ship of over 1,600 tons gross and one under this tonnage were sunk by submarines or mines, as well as sixteen fishing smacks."

New York, March 7.—The New York Times prints the following. A monster fleet of 500 trawlers from Grimsby, Hull, Lait, Yarmouth, Lowestoft and other North Sea fishing ports, aided by fast destroyers and patrol boats, is guarding the mouth of the English Channel and Irish Sea with many devices for catching and destroying submarines, according to one of the first cabin passengers of the Cunarder Carmania, which arrived here to-day from Liverpool.

The passengers that when he was at Devenport dockyard on February 21 one of the Admiralty officials informed him that the German navy was credited with having 100 submarines of all sizes, from the old type of submersible



90 feet long, which operated from Zeebrugge, Belgium, to the latest U-boat from Kiel, ranging from 195 to 230 feet long. The result of the defensive move on the part of the Admiralty was that the mosquito fleet had destroyed or captured 48 by February 16, which caused the big decrease in the number of vessels torpedoed after that date.

Very few of the submarines were captured and brought into port, it was said, as it was too much trouble to raise them. A few were taken on the surface after they had been disabled by a bomb from an airplane. The others were destroyed by bombs from the trawlers, after they had been entangled in the steel nets.

**Kaiser Kept Going  
By Drugs**

New York, March 9.—A despatch to the N. Y. Herald from Havana says. One of the most prominent Spaniards in Cuba to-day showed to me a letter he received yesterday from Madrid. The writer of the letter says he has just returned home from a trip to Germany, where he saw the Kaiser, with whom he had a talk concerning the crisis in the relations between Germany and the United States. He said the Kaiser blamed Great Britain, which, he asserted, was responsible for false impressions in Germany and the United States, and charged that President Wilson was influenced by Great Britain.

"The Kaiser is in wretched health, and is kept going only by stimulants," the writer of the letter said.

"His physicians are administering morphine in large doses, as the only means of affording him rest and sleep. Excitement keeps him alive, I believe.

"I am convinced that the war is nearing the end, and that the Emperor will not live six months after peace is declared."

He said that while in Berlin he learned authoritatively that there
