A Committee of three were appointed to examine bills and acts with the Secretary-Treasurer and report tomorrow afternoon. Couns. Perry, Lamont and J. W. Gallagher were appointed such committee.

The Warden read the following:
January 16, 1917.

To the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council of the County of Carleton.

Gentlemen,

I would ask your attention to the matter of authorizing the expense of Consolidating some of the Record Indexes.

In 1886 the Council authorized an expense for Consolidating the record book indexes from the beginning of the County in 1832, down to and including 1882, taking in from Book A to Z, and from A No. 2 to and including Z No. 2. This book was completed and is now in use.

Subsequently another Consolidated Index was authorized and made, and takes in the books from A, No. 3 to Z No. 3 and this Index is now in use. This book runs from 1882 to 1899.

Subsequently another Consolidated Index was made up running from 1899 to 1903 and taking in Books A, No. 4 to G, No. 4, and this is now in use.

There has been no consolidation since the above date 1903.

Judson Briggs

Judson Briggs, of Lindsay, who has been ill with rheumatism and hardening of the arteries for six years, died at his home Wednesday night, aged 66 years. He was a prominent member of the Agricultural Society, a leading prize winner at the shows, and a lover of light driving horses, having entries in many races for farmers' horses in this town. He is survived by the widow, formerly Miss Flemming, two sons Harry and Roy, of Lindsay and one daughter Mrs. Clarence Black, of Wakefield Centre, two brothers, Samuel Briggs, of Caribou, Me., and E. J. Briggs, of Bellville, and two sisters Mrs. John A. Lindsay, of Lindsay and Mrs. John Mc Lellan, of Oakville. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon, Jan. 20, service being conducted at the home by the Rev. D. S. Helts, of Lindsay, assisted by the Rev. L. A. Fenwick, of Jacksville and the Rev. Mr. Kincaid, of Hartland. The choir sang the hymns, "Lead Kindly Light" and "Nearer My God to Thee". The pall bearers were Havelock Black, William Wilson, John S. McBride and Milton McBride. Interment was in the family lot at Lindsay.

Will Go To Montreal

The Rev. Frank L. Orchard, of Woodstock, N. B., has accepted the invitation to become pastor of Olivet Baptist Church in this city, and will preach in that church on Sunday, February 4.

Mr. Orchard is a native of Queen's County, New Brunswick. He received his education in the Fredericton High School, where he won the distinction of Latin orator and the prize for the highest standing in French. He subsequently attended the University of New Brunswick, where he won the Governor General's medal for the highest standing in economics. He was in turn vice president and president of the student body, for several years the editor of the University Monthly, the leader of the University Debating Team, and president of the University Y. M. C. A.

His influence as a religious leader among his fellow students was so fully appreciated by the International Y. M. C. A. organization that he was urged upon his graduation to become a permanent general secretary of the institution and to devote himself to laboring among college students.

Mr. Orchard received his theological training in the Divinity School at Newton, Mass. He has been pastor at Woodstock for nearly three years. His oldest brother is a missionary in India. His younger brother has won the Distinguished Conduct Medal for personal bravery as despatch rider in France. Mrs. Orchard also has two brothers serving in the Canadian Forces in France.
