A Trying Experience

The party had been surveying timber limits about six miles south of Namu, and intent on getting back to civilization for Christmas they set out on the morning of Dec. 14, in a power launch. A heavy storm set in and the launch was run ashore and became a total wreck. They remained prisoners on the island for six days when their signals for help were finally heard by a passing steamer which took them to Victoria.

Coun. F. W. Smith read the following:  
Councillor Fred W. Smith  
Chairman of Special Committee of Council in regard to Consolidating County Record Indexes.

Dear Sir,  
In regard to the work of Consolidating the Indexes, and the expenses of doing this work, will say that the labor of doing this does not belong to me as Registrar, for the years previous to my acceptance of the office.

I explained to the Committee just what the work comprises, and will also explain the same in this letter.

Taking the present Consolidated Index from 1882 to 1899 as a sample of what is to be done, for the Series of Books of Number Four from A to Z, No. 4.

The work of compiling and arranging in alphabetical order, both as regards Grantors and Grantees as well, and both in regard to the given name and as well as the surnames.

In this manner, any persons transfers either to or from him, will be shown at a glance, and following one another in regular order.

Then as soon as the Books call for another Consolidation, of the names that are now indexed in the Current Index, which is in series No. 5 and we are now working and copying in Book 1, No. 6, it will be in order that another Consolidated Index be made up, when we get to Book M, No. 5, and thus relieve the Current Index of that much.

I am prepared to undertake and complete the Consolidating of all the Indexes down to the time that my appointment was made, June 12, 1917 and in

form, to be the same as the present Consolidated Indexes, for the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, the cost of paper and binding to be paid by the County; and will Consolidate the work after I took charge free and without any charge, other than paper and binding as provided in the Registry Act. The work to be paid for when completed, and approved of by a Committee of the Council, in accordance with the above specifications.
