Thomas Stevenson

The news of the death of Thos Stevenson, which occurred on Sunday morning at his residence on the River Road, will be heard with deep regret by many both in town and country.

Deceased had been in failing health for the last few weeks, although not confined to his bed, and the call, which came to him as he slept, was not unexpected.

Born in Donegal, Ireland, in 1840, Mr Stevenson came to this country with his parents and four brothers in 1845, and has spent practically the whole of a long and useful life in Carleton Co. As a boy he learned the carpenter trade and many residences in town and county are his work; later he engaged in a general merchandise business, and about 30 years ago purchased the farm upon which he has since resided.

French Brought In 1400 Prisoners

ITALIAN HEADQUARTERS IN NORTHERN ITALY, Jan. 2.—(By the Associated Press)—The French in their recent successful operation on Mont Tombs captured more prisoners than they had men engaged, according to a veteran officer who witnessed the fight. From the top of a nearby hill he saw the French attack and afterwards saw the prisoners, guns and booty brought in. The French also captured their first Austrian prisoners, which is another milestone for them, heretofore they had captured only Germans, the officer said.

In addition to the 1,400 prisoners we counted 500 dead on the ground, and no one knows how many more were in the caverns and underbrush. The perfect French military system enabled them to accomplish this with insignificant loss—less than fifty men.

When the prisoners were brought in I never saw a more miserable, pitiful, starved lot of soldiers. They looked like the rif raff from the slums of some big city. Even the officers appeared underfed and underclothed, and I saw only one with a whole pair of breeches.
