The Allies can forestall any such ac in New York in that condition, as rimonious debate by meeting the Ger man peace offensive at once. They must now get together and formulate a definite counter offensive. Two plans of campaign are possible. With the pol itical union equal to that of the Central Powers, they can either formulate their own set of peace proposals, or they must ask the German Government cate gorical questions as to the exact meanpirate law for one that accords ing of its latest proposals and other questions vital to the Allies' considera tion of peace. Such questions, or a counter peace proposal on the part of the Allies, would put the Germans on the netensive again regarding peace and prevent any disruption of the Entente. The Allies must meet the powerful peace offensive of the Central Powers promptly and courageously with a uni efid and high minded policy.

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
