FEEDING THE BEES

Syrup made from the best grade of white granulated sugar is a safe substitute for honey in spring and & ... mer and a desirable supplemedary food for winter. For autumn feeding use two parts of sugar to one of water, in the interior of Canada, and two and a half parts sugar to one of water at the coast. To get the sugar to dissolve completely, the water must be hot, and if the syrup i made over the fire, the sugar must be added to the water in smell quantities at a time and stirred constantly until dissolved, to prewest it from settling to the bottom of the vessel and burning. Burned sugar is very unwholesome for bees and would cause their death during winter. To prevent the syrup from granulating. a teaspoonfal of tartaric acid may be ndded to every twenty pounds of sugar,
